

South African Shoots 68 For A New Course Record

 HOYLAKE, Eng. (AP)—South African Garry Player carved a course record of 68 out of 72 on Monday in qualifying play for the British Open golf champ-ship.

The 20-year-old player—a shooter of great promise—provided the only genuine sensation in a day of high winds and even higher scores. His three-under-par round included a magnificent 32 on the homework nine.

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Gene Sarazen, the American who won this title in 1932, got a 77 at Hoylake, and as he finished he said: "I never putted so badly." Frank Stranahan, the former amateur from Toledo, Ohio, messed up his Hoylake round with a seven at the sixth hole and finished with a 78.

Entries who played their first qualifying round at Hoylake Monday were:

England's Charlie Ward, who was regarded as a fading player, aged a 69 on the easier Wallacey course where half the record field of 330 played for qualifying scores.

Belgium's Flory Van Donck, a real threat to take this title, also shot 69 at Wallacey.

BALDING FIRES 72
 At Balding of Toronto posted a 37-35—72 at Wallacey. Stan Leon-

ard of Vancouver and Lachute, Que., went round Hoylake in 74. "I played well most of the way but had two sixes—at the third and 14th," Leonard said. He took 37 both out and in.

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McCluskey Draws With Simon To Retain Crown

NEW GLASGOW — Although held to a draw in 10 rounds, Cobey McCluskey, 153, Dartmouth, retained his Mar-time middleweight boxing title here against Gary Simon, 155, New Glasgow. McCluskey's key led in the early rounds but Simon made a strong comeback, although he lost the 9th on account of a low blow.

The three judges voted as follows: Dan MacMillan, 5 Simon, 3 McCluskey, 2 even; Reg Collie, 6 McCluskey, 3 Simon, 1 even; Dave Melanson, 4-2.

In the six-round semi-final veteran Bob Leadley, 160, Dartmouth, gained the unanimous decision over Johnny Griffiths, 156½, Halifax. Bobby Duff, 130, Stellarton, knocked out Bobby Burns, 135, Halifax, at 41 seconds of the first round. Donnie Hughes, 142½, Thorburn, decisioned Allie MacDonald, 143, Stellarton.

Richardson And Seixas Eke Out Tennis Victories

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Diabletic Ham Richardson and Adebic Vic Seixas, sure bets for the American Davis Cup team again this year struggled through to shabby victories Monday in quarter-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

Seixas weathered out an hour and 20 minutes first set against young Allen Morris of Atlanta, to win 13-11. Morris pulled up lame in the second set and Seixas took the match 13-11, 6-0, 6-3.

Richardson appeared to be on the way to a beating when he rallied strongly in the third set to defeat Australia's power hitting left-hander, Neal Fraser, 6-3, 9-11, 7-5, 6-4.

The entry of America's potential Davis Cup team into the semifinals of the 70th Wimbledon championship was matched by the potential Australian Davis Cup team.

Low Road struggled home over fellow Australian Mal Anderson, 4-6, 6-1, 13-11. Ken Rosewall, Australia's No. 2, was the only semi-finalist with an easy passage. He won with supreme ease over Sweden's rising young star, Ulf Schmidt, 6-1, 6-3, 6-2.

Wednesday's semi-final between Head and Richardson in the top of the draw and between Rosewall and Seixas in the bottom is practically a certainty to be staged in Adelaide, Australia, Dec. 25-27 when Australia defends the Davis Cup.

America is an overwhelming favorite to reach the challenge round. Team captain Bill Talbert said Richardson and Seixas are certainly the top two players right now. They look like our Davis Cup team to me.

For the first time in living memory—probably since the First World War—each semi-finalist at Wimbledon has reached his spot in the last four without meeting a seeded player.

UPSET FOR PAT WARD

Quebec Swimmer To Attempt English Channel From Calais

QUEBEC (CP) — A 31-year-old Quebec swimmer, nicknamed "La Corvette" because of the powerful steady stroke, leaves today for Calais, France, where he will try to swim the English Channel.

Jacques Amyot, hefty, blue-eyed veteran of long-distance events in the Quebec area, has tentatively scheduled his attempt for the third week in July when the Channel waters are expected to reach a temperature of 60 degrees Fahrenheit.

Amyot describes the projected swim as the "ambition of my life." It was made financially possible by contributions to a fund organized by Quebec businessmen following the swimmer's impressive performances in this area in the last few years.

Accompanying Amyot on the trip will be his coach, Joseph Lachance, Amyot's brother Philippe, and another swimmer, Raymond Roy.

Lachance thinks Amyot can keep up a pace of 50 strokes a minute during most of the swim.

IN GOOD SHAPE
 Amyot is described as being in "top shape" and ready to face even colder water temperatures than in the cold waters of Lake St. Joseph in the Laurentian Mountains, 30 miles north of Quebec City, and in the St. Lawrence River for the last few weeks.

He has been planning to make the swim across the Channel ever since 1954 when he plunged in the
