Island Remains Excluded In Designated Area Plan

Returning from a trip to Banff, Alta., where he discussed the federal "designated area" program with Industry Minister M. Drury, Provincial Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said yesterday, "No change in the designated area program to include this province was indicated by Mr. Drury."

Through Canada, 35 areas have been named in which new industry will receive an income tax holiday. Last week Mr. Drury explained to Mr. Rossiter that the designated areas were chosen and suggested other locations in their provinces. "Mr. Drury explained, however," he said, "that the criteria for designating areas had already been established, and if a change was made for any one province, changes would have to be made for all provinces."

Mr. Rossiter said that the designated area plan would be extremely beneficial in this province, particularly for the proposed fisheries plant which would be located in the designated area. "It is hoped," said Mr. Rossiter, "that the board will hold its October meeting in Charlottetown, where these proposals can be discussed."

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Injured Woman Flown To Halifax

A woman in her early 30's from Charlottetown and Halifax was flown to hospital in that city from Charlottetown last night suffering from suspected back injuries sustained around 7:30 p.m. when a car went off the road near Harpurville.

The accident occurred on the Colville Road near Glou's store when the Island-registered vehicle apparently rolled over into the ditch. The woman, believed to be a Phyllis Fraser from Halifax, but living in Charlottetown, although identification was not positive, was taken to the P.F.I. Hospital.

Shortly after 11 p.m. she was flown from Charlottetown to Halifax on an air rescue craft from Greenwood. 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'64 Regional Festival Slated For Montague

Mr. M.F. Rodd, chairman of the Regional Drama Festival, has announced that the 1964 regional competitions will be staged in Montague. Following a recent meeting the invitation extended by the Town of Montague was accepted, and the festival will be held March 11-13.

Mr. Rodd said, "This coming year's regional festival has special significance and will be of particular interest to all theatrical groups and theatre lovers throughout the Island as in May the Dominion Festival will be held in the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building in Charlottetown."

Mr. Rodd said he hoped the Montague festival would have a large jury list. An adjudicator for the festival will be announced shortly, which they in turn may sell for \$4 apiece.

INDUSTRY DEPT. Needs Top Men OTTAWA (CP)—The new department of industry launched Tuesday a recruiting drive for top executives to help Canada's industry. Industry Minister Drury announced that in the next three months the department wants about 165 top men. They will be paid salaries of about \$10,000 a year or higher.

THE LIST includes seven branch directors at salaries up to \$17,000. Seven division chiefs at salaries up to \$15,000. 30 division chiefs at salaries up to \$14,200. About 120 area and industrial development officers at salaries up to \$11,800. Details of the requirements were included in a booklet issued jointly by the minister and the Civil Service Commission, outlining the jobs and where applications may be made.
