

Local and Other Items.

THE regular meeting of the Ladies' Aid League will be held in Full's Hall, to-morrow (Tuesday) evening, at half past seven o'clock. THE Liberal-Conservatives of Shelburne, N. S., has unanimously nominated Hon. N. W. White as the Dominion candidate at the coming election. CHARLES FAWCETT, Esq., of Sackville, N. B., is making his annual tour of the Province. Mr. Fawcett reports a boom in trade through the effects of the National Policy.

THE steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax last night. The "M. A. Starr" has been in the ice in the Gut of Canso since the 12th. She has a valuable cargo of merchandise. THE steamer "Carroll" will arrive to-morrow evening, and sail for Boston on Thursday evening. The "Worcester" left Boston for Halifax on Saturday. She will not come to this port until the 6th of June.

FRED CHAMBERLAIN, a widely known farmer of Greenfield, Mass., and his wife, died, on the 17th inst., from poison. Chamberlain was innoculated in his hands from gunn, with which he was fertilizing land. His wife was poisoned from dressing his shoes. The effect was swift; and their bodies were bloated and disfigured, and were with difficulty confined.

THERE is intense excitement in San Francisco upon the Chinese question. A shipload of celestials is in quarantine with nearly one hundred cases of smallpox among her passengers, and wholesale vaccination has no appreciable effect. A second shipload of 1,200 has arrived, and to add to the exasperation of the white portion of the community, it is announced that 2,000 coolies will soon arrive.

The man appointed to represent me at St. Peters Bay, I afterwards told not to. Not satisfied with this, he now ranks me with the Government, and consequently false to the cause of my adoption. He goes on to place me with his opponents. I have sufficient proof of what I opposed Mr. Bowers on. It was his wholesale abuse of Protestants at Burn's Road meeting, when he thought he was before a Catholic audience. He showed up largely how many thousand dollars Catholics were wronged by them. He also attacked a private Protestant gentleman, and designated him as being "the greatest bigot that ever walked the streets of Charlottetown." This was the first time I believed what I so often heard, and I assailed Mr. Bowers for his low conduct. Now, if Mr. Bowers can find one man in the district that I canvassed in favour of the Government, I will say his assertions are correct. But he cannot do this, and he thinks, by slandering me in this slippery way, to put me out of dispute, so he may dream in peace of those "hundreds first opportunity that offers."
