House Builders May Cut Profits For Ready Sales

OTTAWA, May 26 — (CP) — Canada's house builders are still searching for high profits but they are showing a readiness to sacrifice part of them for bigger sales and increased government loans, the Commons banking committee was told.

D. B. Mansur, head of the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, said the response to the C. M. H. C. offer to increase builders' loans in return for a fixed sale price is "satisfactory".

Between October, 1951, and April 1, 1952, the corporation had received 2,012 requests to shift loans to higher levels in return for a selling price on the house fixed by the corporation.

"This would tend to show that the builders had adjusted their sights as to the amount of profit they were willing to accept in return for ready sales," he said.

Dealing with another aspect of construction financing, Mr. Mansur indicated that the C. M. H. C. and Canada's commercial lending institutions do not see eye-to-eye on mortgage-loan policy.

He said the short amortization period is the "holy cow" of the lending institutions. They were more interested in protecting their loans than in maintaining a "flexible and progressive policy."

Turning to the question of builders' loans, Mr. Mansur said at one point: "There are exceptions but most builders are interested in obtaining as large a profit on each house as possible."

Legion Would Keep Meyer In Prison For Life

By Douglas How MONTREAL, May 26 — (CP) — After a debate hot and unhappy with memories of the battlefield, the Canadian Legion's national convention called on the government to keep Kurt Meyer in prison for life. It narrowly rejected a proposal that he be returned to a Canadian prison from Germany.

During the argument, one man who had buried the victims of Meyer's troops' atrocities cried out against any suggestion that the former German S.S. general should be released.

Earlier, a man made prisoner at Dieppe took the opposite view. The views ranged between those extremes after the chairman said the Legion has been informed by Defence Minister Claxton that the government has no intention of dealing with Meyer's sentence "at this time."

He said Mr. Claxton made the statement in a letter—written in January or February—adding that Canada still has ultimate control of the man serving life for responsibility for the shooting of 16 Canadian prisoners in Normandy in 1944.

The resolution was based on the belief that the government is moving toward Meyer's release. Its preamble said so.

When it came to a vote, the support was heavily in favor of the resolution. Some shouted disapproval but not many. The convention, in the fourth of five days, also:

1. Elected Dr. C.B. Lumden, M. M. 57, Bible-teaching professor at Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., to be president. Another clergyman, Dean J.O. Anderson of Weymouth got the No. 2 job as first vice-president.

2. Heard Maj.-Gen. F.F. Worthington, civil defence co-ordinator, say Canada will have 160,000 trained civil defence volunteers by March, 1953, triple the present number.

3. Unanimously endorsed a motion by retiring president, Group Capt. Alfred Watts of Vancouver, saying the press has a right to write what it wants. This followed statements by relatively few members attacking articles and headlines in the Montreal Herald.
