### First Aid For Ailing Houses

**CLEANING USED TILE**  
QUESTION: How can one clean plastic tile for reuse? We remodelled our kitchen, removed the tile very carefully which left tiles full of paste, etc.  
ANSWER: Only the specific solvent recommended by the tile paste manufacturer can be used to soften the paste and remove it. Otherwise, the only suggestion I can offer is careful use of a portable sander to grind it off.

**GETTING RID OF BATS**  
QUESTION: Have you any suggestions on how to get rid of the bats in our attic? We've closed the vents with screens; how to find where they come in?  
ANSWER: To drive the bats try burning a sulphur candle (be very careful of the fire hazard) in the attic. Bats can enter through very tiny crevices all such crevices (along eaves, window frames, etc.) should be found and closed. A colorless, gelatinous preparation, used for discouraging birds from roosting, spread on the bats' roosting areas will also discourage these animals; available at large garden supplies dealers.

**REMOVING METAL TILE**  
QUESTION: I would like to take the metal tile off our bathroom wall without damaging the plaster so that I can cover the wall with another tile. The old tiles are losing the paint and some are rusted through, especially around the tub and near the stand where acid has ruined it. I have asked at the stores to no avail.  
ANSWER: Special adhesives are used for applying metal tile and require special solvents. Try to find out what adhesive was

used with your tile. Use the recommended solvent to soften the adhesive, then pry loose. If unable to determine the specific solvent necessary, try using naphtha (be very careful of the fire hazard); sometimes this is successful.  
Spackle can be used to smooth and fill any gouge or unevenness in the plaster surface.  
**CRACKED STONE SIDING**  
QUESTION: My house has form stone on it. This has a number of cracks, some are a couple of inches long, some a couple of feet. What could I use to patch these cracks with?  
ANSWER: Use a latex patching concrete, available at masonry supplies dealers and some large hardware stores.

**DOG ODOR IN FLOOR**  
QUESTION: Before we had our old dog put to sleep we discovered she had made some mistakes on our oak floor in the den. It was cleaned with antiseptic on discovering it, but we are now noticing an odor. Is there any remedy short of re-flooring?  
ANSWER: Scatter the den floor with liberal amounts of "para" crystals or flakes. This is a powerful deodorant as well as moth preventive. Keep the room closed for two to three days, then sweep or vacuum up the crystals. The crystals will leave an odor, but this will disappear quickly on airing. Repeat if necessary.

**STONE FIREPLACE DIRTY**  
QUESTION: We have a large limestone fireplace. It was rather dull so I used some diluted linseed oil to give it luster. It darkened the stone and also collected smoke which made it dark and dirty-looking. How can I restore it to natural color and clean the stones?  
ANSWER: Unless excess linseed oil is wiped within an hour, it dries forming a gummy surface which is almost impos-

**KITCHEN VENTILATION**  
QUESTION: What is the best way to ventilate my kitchen? An exhaust fan or a hood with charcoal, etc., run by electricity? The kitchen is about nine by 12. Where can I get information about the best type of hood?  
ANSWER: For ventilating the kitchen, an exhaust fan, when draws out all cooking vapors to the outdoors, creates better air circulation and ventilation, stronger air currents are created. A hood is excellent for accumulating greasy kitchen vapors and filtering them. Information about kitchen hoods is available at your local utilities office, or consult your classified, telephone directory under "Range Ventilating Hoods."

**WATER MARKS ON SILK**  
QUESTION: How can I remove water marks from a silk lamp shade?  
ANSWER: Water marks on materials are usually due to sizing or other finishing agents being dislodged and then redeposited. Try scratching the marks lightly with the finger-nail or rub them with a clean, stiff brush. If shade is sewed (not glued) in the frame and the material is colorfast, try gently steaming (keeping shade as far from spout as possible) with kettle or steam iron.

**BLISTERING PLASTER**  
QUESTION: I had an upstairs study remodelled. The new plaster wall is blistering or developing "boils" on the surface. The bubbles burst and become crusty. How can this be corrected?  
ANSWER: The blistering is probably caused by lime that was not sufficiently slaked. Slaking continues with moisture ab-

sorbed from the air and will eventually be complete. But, of course, the plaster will be softened and powdery. The best remedy would be to replace the plaster. Alternately, you can wait until the blistering stops, and then brush off all loose particles and smooth on another finish coat of plaster.  
**SPOTS OF ADHESIVE IN TUB**  
QUESTION: Because we had a shower installed in our tub, I covered the upper part of the walls around the tub also with plastic tile. Some of the adhesive splattered unnoticed on the tub bottom and hardened. How can I safely remove these spots of adhesive?  
ANSWER: Use the solvent recommended for the adhesive, or, use lacquer thinner to soften the adhesive and then take it up with coarse cloths. The latter is a highly flammable liquid; be careful of the fire hazard while using it and be sure the bathroom is well-ventilated while working. (Note: All correspondence

# TOURIST INFORMATION GUIDE

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Try cleaning the stones with a masonry and stone-cleaning and etching preparation (not containing muriatic acid), available at masonry supplies dealers and some large hardware stores; follow label instructions for use carefully. Or scrub with fine steel wool and scouring powder or a mechanics hand soap containing sand; then rinse thoroughly with clear water to remove all trace of the cleaner.

**RUST IN TOILET TANKS**  
QUESTION: The water tanks of our two toilets are lined with rust and iron. Most of it was able to wipe out, but there are places I've been unable to clean. Is there some product that I could put in the tanks that would eat this away?  
ANSWER: You might try the following to remove these stains:
