Opening lead—six of hearts. Let's suppose you're playing against a good pair and that they contract for a slam, expecting to make it. Rarely, if these conditions are true, will the opponents fail to take at least eleven tricks.

Seldom, therefore, will you fatten your score much by doubling the opponents when they bid a slam. The double may net you an extra 50 or 100 points when you feel reasonably sure of defeating the contract, but it is no big deal.

However, if the result of doubling is that you chase the opponents into a contract which they can make, from one which they cannot make, you suffer a substantial loss because of the double.

Thus, if the vulnerable opponents bid and make a minor suit slam, they score 150 points. If they go down one undoubled, they lose 400 points; if they go down one doubled, they lose 200 points. Hence, in the long run, it does not pay to double the opponents unless you have them lashed to the mast regardless of what they do.

Furthermore, an injudicious double frequently helps declarer in the play, because it alerts him to where the missing strength is located, and he may, as a result, make the slam in a hand where he would go down in the absence of the double.

There is one important exception to the general principle of not doubling slams voluntarily reached. The double can be properly used by the player not on lead to indicate to the defender on lead that the slam can be beaten if an unusual lead is made. A double by the player not on lead is a bid that carries special meaning. It is a conventional bid requesting an out of the ordinary lead.

The slam-doubling convention applies in the deal shown. It is not hard for West to deduce, considering his heart length and dummy's heart bid, that the unusual lead requested is a heart. This is the only lead which can defeat the contract.

Study Of Outer Space Suggested By Russia

Russia called on the West Tuesday to set up an international conference of scientists to study outer space.

Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily Kuznetsov brought out his surprise proposal at the United Nations general assembly while stressing Russia's successes in the space field.

At the same time it was reported that Canada's proposal for a worldwide study of radiation was coming to a head.

About 12 countries, it was understood, are ready to support the proposal.

The Canadian delegation announced Green would hold a press conference today to explain details of the plan, which so far has been sketched only in outline, particularly by the minister in his policy speech before the assembly.

Members of the Canadian delegation have stressed they hope to keep the radiation issue inevitably linked with disarmament—out of the arena of the cold war, seeking instead general approval from all sides.

Kuznetsov's statement on outer space came at a time when the Soviet Union is riding high in scientific prestige and taking numerous opportunities at the UN to remind the rest of the world of its success.

His speech was generally mild in tone. It consisted mainly of an appeal for urgent action on Soviet Premier Khrushchev's proposal made here 19 days ago for complete world disarmament in four years.

But Kuznetsov served notice the Soviet Union would maintain its boycott of the present UN committee on peaceful uses of outer space.

NO BALANCE

The Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia and Poland refused to take part in the committee's work on the ground it did not include a sufficient representation of Communist and neutral countries.

India and the United Arab Republic refused to join the committee's work, on the ground lack of Soviet participation made such efforts useless.

Kuznetsov departed from his prepared text to tell delegates the latest Soviet rocket "is right now travelling around the moon."

"It is necessary to ensure the widest possible co-operation based on equality among all countries in the questions of exploring outer space and of utilizing it to the benefit of mankind."

As to the new proposal, he said:

"Taking into account the benefits of the exchange of experience in the field of scientific research and accomplishments for a more rapid progress in exploring outer space, the Soviet government intends, in particular, to put forward the proposal to convene under UN auspices an international conference in exploring outer space."
