

ing independently and impartially, agreeably to his prospectus. If the "Islander" think that a public servant can shield himself under a name from the severest scrutiny into his public conduct, he is most egregiously mistaken. But supposing, for a moment, that the Governor is precluded, by the dignity of his office, from defending himself, if his conduct be defensible, why did not the Editor of the "Islander" step forth and champion his cause? His remarks, however, are conceived in ignorance and produced in servility, for which he, no doubt, has his reasons. He should not be ignorant that the Governor General, last year, not only explained his political views in the public prints, but descended to deprecate opposition to his Government from the fierce spirits with whom he was brought into collision, until his physical energies sunk in the hopeless contest. It is matter of history, how Sir Francis B. Head, by writing in the newspapers, prostrated, on the one hand, a democratic majority in the House of Assembly, and on the other, an all-engrossing "family compact" (such as we have in this Island), so effectually, that those factions have as we held up their heads since. He did not commit the fatal error of arraying the regulars of the empire against the militia of the Colony, but he administered the British Constitution in its purity to the mass of the people, and, verily, he had his reward. When his government was assailed by internal insurrection (principally by foreigners), and by invasion from without, and when, about the same time, the Commander of the Forces, in the extremity of his distress, applied to him for as many of the regular troops as he could spare, he boldly answered—"Take them all—every man of them; if this Province be to be saved, it must be by the loyal hearts and strong arms of the colonists." He immediately issued, through the public press, a splendid series of heart-stirring appeals, which vibrated to the core of every British bosom, with an intensity only to be felt by those who knew their fate depended upon his success. And nobly and enthusiastically did the free yeomanry of Upper Canada respond to the call and confidence of their able and heroic Governor. In forty-eight hours he was at the head of upwards of ten thousand armed men. But Sir Francis is a man of great talent and political sagacity—comparisons are proverbially odious!

The Editor of the "Islander" having modestly favoured the public with an Academy "scheme," which, I dare say, might have been useful about a hundred years ago, but which is altogether unsuited to the educational wants of this practical age, I take the liberty of showing your readers how admirably well qualified this would-be freeloader is to teach logic in said Academy. He remarks—"The loyal inhabitants of this Island do not look upon him (D. Maclean) with any favour." But his political conduct is approved of by his constituents: Therefore, his constituents must be disloyal. From this conclusion there is no escape, and if it be a libel on my constituents, I doubt not they will know how to appreciate the compliment at a fitting time. But it is true, what has made them disloyal? Misgovernment! misgovernment! misgovernment!! I apprehend the world is on the eve of great changes. I am of opinion that the battle of Armageddon will be fought in North America. The signs of the times seem to be nearly full—a Comet does not appear in the West, without a cause!

SCHOOL VISITOR'S REPORT.

An Account of the following Schools was inadvertently omitted in the School Visitor's last Report.

Tryon, (eastern section), George Byron, Teacher.—The School of this District was closed a considerable time previous to the present Teacher's succeeding to the charge thereof. When examined, 25 scholars were found to be in attendance, learning the usual rudimentary branches from the Alphabet to English Grammar. The method of teaching pursued is judicious. The children of this District, generally, sustain a character for propriety of conduct—a proof of the attention which is paid to their morals.

Tryon, James Glander, Teacher.—A new and commodious school-house was erected at this station, and opened in the month of August last, under the present teacher. When visited in December last, 43 scholars were on the roll. The state of improvement to which this School is brought, is deserving of particular notice; and considering the tender age of the majority of the children, their proficiency is not exceeded by those in any school in the county. The more advanced classes displayed an extensive and correct acquaintance with the elements of English Grammar, and read the higher class-books with fluency. Arithmetic and writing are also taught by the most efficient methods. In this school, religious instruction also is blended with secular teaching.

Within a mile of the foregoing station, is another School—David J. Thomson, Teacher.—This school was left by the former teacher in a state of considerable improvement. The present one succeeded to the charge in August last. The children, with few exceptions, are well advanced in reading and writing. A class also learn English Grammar.

Crapaud, James Buipt, Teacher.—This School is well attended, 42 being on the roll; reading, writing and arithmetic are taught with success. Those who commenced with the present teacher in June last, have made very satisfactory progress. There are several excellent writers in particular in this school, and the system of discipline enforced is judicious and highly efficient.

De Sable, Donald Campbell, Teacher.—There are 40 Scholars in attendance on this School, who have in general made satisfactory progress during the past year; several in the higher classes were well advanced under the last teacher at this station. English Grammar is taught in addition to the common inferior branches. The School-house is comfortable and commodious.

It is to be regretted that this District has been divided, and a second School (for which there seems to be little occasion) opened within a short distance of the above, and both drawing the public money. 30 Scholars attend this School. Reading Writing and Arithmetic are taught. A class have made some advances in English Grammar also. Being a new School, the improvement has been as great as could be expected.

FIRE.—On Friday last, the 25th ult., at 2 o'clock, p. m., the dwelling-house of Mr. George Lefargie, Wilmot Creek, Bedeque, was burned to the ground. The destruction of the property was occasioned by a child's having taken fire, whilst the family were at dinner, into a room adjoining the house, and which room was used as a carpenter's work-shop. The existence of the fire there was not discovered before the whole apartment was filled with flames. With the dwelling-house were destroyed upwards of 120 bushels of grain (principally wheat), 100 bushels of potatoes, and all the inside materials (complete) for a new house.—Islander.
