THE BROCKVILLE ELECTION.

A Brockville despatch shows how the election there was won by the Liberals. The developments of the fight show the grossest and most barefaced corruption in the annals of Canadian politics. For days before the election the riding was overrun with a horde of the most unscrupulous Grit heelers, who openly distributed money like water, and concocted plans to serve their own ends. There is also evidence showing the boxes to have been stuffed. About 4 o'clock it was conceded by many prominent Liberals that Mr. White had won. Subsequent events showed that an election, like a horse race, is a very uncertain quantity. The Conservatives lost heavily by ballots marked in blue and red pencil for Mr. White, which the deputy returning officers threw out. At times there were coloured pencils, and at other times a black pencil, to suit the political complexion of the voter. Ballot marked with black pencil only were allowed. It is strange that Mr. White should have received all the ballots marked otherwise.

OBITUARY.

With feelings of regret was heard the death of Philip Steel, of Sturgeon, which occurred on Friday, April 14th, 1899, at the age of 55 years. He was a quiet unassuming man, of upright character, beloved by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. For about three years he was troubled with bronchitis, and this proved fatal. He died as he lived, trusting in a just God and sanctified by the last rites of the Catholic church. His funeral took place on Sunday, the body being followed by a large number of people to St. Mary's church, and from thence to the grave-yard where, amid the tears of a large circle of friends and relatives, the body was laid to rest to await the solemn triumph of the last day to rise, let us hope, in unity with our Divine Saviour. Deceased leaves a wife and four children, 2 sons and 2 daughters, to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and loving father.

—According to Superintendent McLeod's report the number of schools having an average daily attendance of 10 pupils or less, is only twenty, or about 3 per cent of the total number of school departments in the Province. The Goat and the Calf.

It is an interesting study to note in domestic animals the traits of their wild ancestors. There are some characteristics, of course, which are readily recognizable as being similar to those of animals still in a wild state, and for this reason they give a fair idea of the life and surroundings of progenitors. The habits of the dog and cat are too familiar to comment on, but take the goat and compare his traits with those of the calf.

The goat when a few days old can gallop as fast as he ever can in after life. He never leaves the dam, and takes nourishment in small quantities, avoiding a full meal, which would impede swift escape. In lying down no attempt is made at concealment, and when he stands his head is held high. These habits show that the animal's ancestors spent their lives in the open and not in the forests and that they were great travelers.

The calf, on the contrary, fills himself with milk, and is a poor traveler. When danger approaches, his first impulse is to conceal himself. He holds his head low in order to look under the branches of the forest. All his characteristics point to the fact that the ancestral home of cattle was in a moist, wooded country, while the primeval horse roamed the plains.—New York Times

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Waterworks Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable thereto for such Waterworks Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of ten Cents (10c) on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. A discount of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

A By-law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property for general civic purposes under Statute 51 Victoria, Chapter 12.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of seven-tenths of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of seven-tenths of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.
