Up To 75 Acres Of Woodland Burned Over

An estimated 50 to 75 acres of woodland was burned over the weekend near Elliotville on a farm owned by Mr. Thomas Troy of Greenfield. The fire, of unknown origin, broke out Saturday afternoon east of the Brothers Road at a point near the district line between Elliotville and Summerville. It burned in an easterly and north easterly direction over the farms besides that of Mr. Troy, of Gerald Walsh, Joseph Cullen and Henry MacGulgan. A bulldozer was brought in to help the firefighters, but the blaze continued unabated until early yesterday morning when it was extinguished by the torrential rain which swept over the area shortly after midnight.
