THE rear coach of the north bound passenger train on the Colorado and Santa Fe Railway jumped the track above Lyons on Monday last and went down a ten-foot embankment. A Mrs. Leckett is reported killed and 15 persons injured.

THE death rate in Montreal last week was much larger than usual, presumably on account of the high temperature. One hundred and twenty deaths occurred; of this number 81 were under 5 years, 4 were from typhoid fever, 2 from diphtheria, 15 from cholera infantum, 13 from diarrhoea and 1 from dysentery.

EX-COUNSELLOR GEORGE CHAMBERS, of Pittsburgh, Pa., has decided to swim the whirlpool at Niagara. He will start next week, and if nobody interferes will go through the whirlpool without a cork jacket, barrel or anything else, depending on his power as a swimmer. Good bye, George! A CORRESPONDENT writing from Georgetown, yesterday, says: The much-prized blue-backs are catching "fits" in Georgetown harbor this evening. Upwards of fifty fishermen are making good hauls within five hundred yards of the wharf. William Sanderson, Esq., says the like has not happened for the last twenty-five years.

WE are pleased to learn by special despatch from Brackley, that the law-tennis team—Messrs. Leith, Becken, D. B. Stewart, H. V. Palmer and A. A. Bartlett—who left yesterday morning to engage in a match game with the Pictou club, have been victorious, the scores being Charlottetown 12 sets, Pictou 4 sets. The Island team will return this evening.

ABOUT one hundred sail of American fishing vessels were, yesterday (Thursday), off the North Side, between the two chapels, within two miles of the shore. There was an American cutter amongst them, who seemed to pose as a protector rather than as a check on the seiners. They are over a large body of mackerel and are heaving their seines in nine fathoms of water. Where are the cruisers?

THE W. C. T. U. of Montreal has established a reading room for working girls. It is handsomely fitted up and adorned with pictures and flowers. Here the girls can spend their unoccupied hours, read and rest. Some of the ladies are always present to extend a warm welcome. This is practical Christianity. We should like to see a similar institution established in Charlottetown.

A LARGE dynamite bomb was found on Monday under the kitchen window of the residence of Mr. Spruce, a member of the Chicago Board of Trade.

A MAN named Bouchard, who assaulted a young girl in Montreal, in May last, and who has since eluded the police, was captured there on Tuesday morning.

THE British corvette Diamond, took possession in the name of the British Crown of the Kermadec Islands in the South Pacific Ocean, on the first of August.

THE auction sale of works of art in marble, alabaster, &c., continues this Friday evening at 7 o'clock. Elegant vases and other superb articles were sold last night at slaughter prices.—A. McNeill, Auctioneer.

FIVE PERSONS were killed in Paris, on Monday, by the fall of a wall weakened by the floods, caused by the heavy rain storm. The rain was accompanied by a fearful hail storm, hailstones falling as large as walnuts.

By an advertisement which appears in another column, the Collector of Inland Revenue makes an announcement which will be of interest to those who paid fees under the "Liquor License Act of 1883." The fees paid in King's and Prince Counties will now be refunded upon application and proof of identity.

THE Charlottetown Rifle Club held its ninth spoon competition at Kensington Range on the 25th inst. Sapper E. V. Longworth won the silver spoon with a score of 51. Hazard, Esq., of the Cameron Block, was successful in obtaining the horn spoon by one point.

THE steamer M. A. Starr, Capt. Ferguson, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports, at 2 o'clock this morning with a cargo of general merchandise and Mr. Geo. McLeod and Mr. Nelson as passengers. She sailed again at 8 a.m. with a cargo of lobsters and Miss A. M. Mosher and Mrs. Sterling and two children as passengers.

THE Lyceum is engaged for the evenings of Monday and Tuesday, September 13th and 14th, prox., when the celebrated Stuart Rogers will give two of his inimitable entertainments. Our people rarely have the opportunity presented them of hearing such a popular and famed artist, and we are sure in this instance they will embrace the privilege.

ONE day not long since the agent of the firm of Weeks & Beer visited the firm of Kiekham, McQuaid & Co., of Scuris West. The drummer tackled the "humorist" of the firm, who inquired, "Who he was travelling for?" "For Weeks & Beer," replied the man of samples. The humorist, lighting a match with the utmost sang froid, replied: "You may be travelling for Weeks, but you do not take kindly to Beer."

A SERIOUS affray occurred on Tuesday in Palmerston, Ont. Three self-styled constables attempted to arrest a man named Wilson, refusing to show any authority for their proceedings, and on his resisting beat him unmercifully with their batons. One of them finally drew a revolver, and firing, seriously wounded one Douglass, an inoffensive bystander. One of the alleged constables named Skyk, of Drayton, photographer, was arrested; the others escaped.

JOHN MURPHY, an old pensioner, who was arrested at Toronto on Saturday for drunkenness, was brought before the Police Magistrate on Monday and sent to jail for 30 days. When in the Police Court he presented a pitiable appearance, his right ankle being broken and his face fearfully cut and bruised. He had been badly used by some one while in the cells, but was too drunk to tell how he received his injuries. On Tuesday morning he was found dead in the city jail. An inquest will be held.

At Shediac, N. B., on Wednesday night, the jewelry store of Mr. W. R. Gould was burglarized, the front door being pried open, evidently by a crowbar, and the safe blown open, two holes being bored in it, one above and the other below the lock. When Mr. Gould went to his store Thursday morning, he found the safe door open about six inches, and he was unable either to open it further or to close it. Up to the time the train left Shediac Mr. Gould was unable to get into his safe and was consequently unable to learn his loss, if any. Mr. Gleason's store next door was also broken into, but the loss has not yet been ascertained.

THE nine policemen, who were recently arrested, charged with murder for firing upon, and it is alleged, killing a number of people during the late riots, were brought up for examination on Tuesday, in the Criminal Court. They all swore that they fired over the heads of the people. Judge Monroe granted the policemen releases on bail, with two sureties qualifying for \$750 in each case. Six of the men who took conspicuous parts in the riots were also committed for trial. The committing magistrate announced that it was his intention to serve all the rioters in the same way.

MR. CHARLES E. BISHOP, who arrived in Boston from New York a few days ago, says that he is to receive \$1,000 for dropping from a balloon fifty feet above the Brooklyn Bridge. Prof. Brown has agreed to use his balloon in the enterprise and the arrangements will be completed in about two weeks time. Bishop is to be let down through the basket by straps passed under his arms and at a signal will be dropped to the water 170 feet below. He will also make seven jumps from great heights into water in different New England towns during the next two weeks. The first jump will be made at Lowell on Monday.
