Duke Harris and Murray Hall added singles. Caron played last year with Anaheim Ramblers where he led the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League in scoring.

NEW YORK (AP) — Middleweight contender Bruno (Hurricane) Carter was staggered in the ninth round but still piled up enough points Saturday night to outpoint Gomeo Brennan in a 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden. Carter, of Paterson, N.J., weighed 156½ to Brennan's 157½. It was the fifth straight victory for Carter and his 15th in 17 pro fights. Brennan, never knocked out in 65 fights, now has a 52-8-8 record. Most of the excitement in the cat-and-mouse bout was provided by the ultra-cautious Brennan in the ninth round. A knockdown, side stepping, safety-first fighter all night, he made Carter midway in the round with a right to the jaw that sent the free-eeeking law-fighter staggering and dazed to the ropes. The three officials had Carter ahead by big margins. Referee Teddy Martin had it 9 rounds to 1, Judge Bill Reetz made it 8-9 and Judge Frank Forbes scored it 7-3. The Associated Press card had Carter ahead 7-3.
