

British Emigration.

LORD DERBY'S SCHEME—ITS ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES.

Voluntary emigration is preferable to any other kind. A man who emigrates of his own will and at his own charges is likely to have considered his own adaptation to his new mode of existence. But there are circumstances in which the State may rightly intervene. The conditions of agriculture in the west of Ireland are of such a description, and the Irish Land act properly authorised the grant of Government assistance. For Imperial objects, as well as for the sake of the emigrants, the State has sometimes good ground for bestowing help. No statesman is more cautious than Lord Derby, and he is of opinion that the State in this country might aid in the enterprise of planting the North-West of Canada with British laborers if the state in Canada will do likewise. Serious difficulties encompass the enterprise. Of the fifty thousand human beings to be settled in the Dominion a considerable minority may be expected to turn out either ineligible or discontented. The United States frontier is near at hand, and after the trouble and expense of locating them, many will probably cross the border. On the other hand, no success could be more gratifying or lucrative if the undertaking should succeed. The profit to the Dominion will be magnificent; and the system on which the promoters of the scheme purpose to carry it out promises to save the settlers from some of the worst preliminary hardships of a plantation in the wilderness. At all events, the prospect appears to have captivated several leaders of the working classes at home. As we reported on Thursday, the Workmen's Emigration League, which has an office in Fetter Lane, is about to memorialize the Colonial Office for leave to partake in the expedition should the Dominion Parliament finally assent to the stipulation on which the British Treasury offers to lend the requisite capital. A Workmen's Emigration League is a novelty. That its members should express a predilection for Canada as a field of labor is yet more novel. There can be no sufficient reason, however, for refusing to let London artisans share in the boom of State-aided emigration, if the State give its aid. There is every reason for favoring their spontaneous selection of Canada if they emigrate at all, and if their selection of Canada be spontaneous. Town laborers are, doubtless, as a river side representative in the League asserted, hardly enough to do any work with which Canada can supply them. It is for themselves to consider whether the market Canada offers for skilled mechanical labor can be really as remunerative as the boundless market of English industry. Field labor is at home everywhere on account of the dead level of its acquirements. A skilled English artisan in Canada, if he cannot find his particular position fitted for him, has to condescend to work on which his especial training is thrown away, or starve. A speaker at the Workmen's meeting on Wednesday described the delight of his companions at the prospect of emigration to a country in which they knew their labor would be remunerated. They will be wise to ascertain before their departure how they know it. Emigration in itself is so admirable an outlet for an overflowing population, and Canada in particular is so exceedingly desirable a field for emigration, that any risk of involving them in the odium of the disappointment of a crowd of town-bred English mechanics, sure to charge their mistake upon anybody and anything rather than themselves and their own helplessness, is peculiarly to be deprecated.—London Times.
