To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir,—I note the following in a news item in your paper of the 22nd inst: "A despatch says Bishop McQuaid addressed his people in strong opposition to the Irish National Land League, and that the following of a few priests with loose consciences did not sanctify the no rent cause."

In the absence of no better authority than "a despatch says," I have no doubt of the above being a fabrication. This dodge to create a prejudice against the Land League in the minds of a certain class is no new one. The convenient phrase, "a despatch says," has done duty before.

A large number of the Chicago Convention delegates were Catholic clergymen from all States of the Union, and I feel certain that Bishop McQuaid has too much respect for his utterances to call them, and the whole body of the Irish clergy who support the Land League, priests with "loose consciences." The despatch manufacturer ought to know that this great Convention unanimously endorsed the Land League and no rent policy. The Boston Pilot, owned by Archbishop Williams, and acknowledged to be the leading Catholic newspaper of America, likewise holds the same opinions as the Convention with reference to the Irish National Land League.

Bishop McQuaid is also credited with styling the League a secret organization. The despatch has evidently overdone the business this time, for none but a Rip Van Winkle, or one unacquainted with its principles, would call it a "secret organization."

This contemptible artifice to strike a blow at the League, over the shoulders of Bishop McQuaid, is too clumsy and transparent to deceive even the most credulous.

Mail Arrangement on Souris to East Point.

A MEETING was called at Red Point, Lot 46, on the 21st Dec. under the auspices of the Red Point Literary Institute to consider the matter of a tri-weekly mail, from Souris to East Point, by the South side. The various speakers on the occasion, expressed themselves entirely favorable to the project, and conclusively pointed out that in consideration of the similar advantages enjoyed by other sections of the Island, the people from Souris to East Point, are at least, justly entitled to a tri-weekly mail.

The following resolutions were then unanimously approved of:—Moved by A. J. McPhee, seconded by Alex. Robertson:—

Whereas, the greater part of the Island is privileged with a daily mail; and the North Side from Souris to East Point, by the North Shore, has a tri-weekly mail.

Therefore Resolved, That the south side, from Souris to East Point, is likewise entitled to a tri-weekly mail.

Moved by T. S. Robertson, seconded by John McLellan:—

That Alex. Robertson, F. E. Foley and A. J. McPhee be appointed a committee to draft petitions to be forwarded to the Dominion Government in connection with the same.

Moved by A. Robertson, seconded by T. S. Robertson, that a report of the meeting be sent to the EXAMINER for publication.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 24.

Mr. James Reid, M. P., for Cariboo, B. C., is in town.

A steamship company with a capital of \$2,500,000 has been formed in San Francisco to do business between San Francisco, Hawaiian Islands and other points on the Pacific.

The contract for the St. Lawrence Railway tunnel has been awarded to a syndicate of contractors, composed of New York and Montreal men. Mr. Walter Shanley will be engineer-in-chief.

UNITED STATES.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Dec. 25.

The Gloucester, Mass., schooner Sougler, in trawl haddock fishery, reports four of her crew missing since Friday, they having failed to reach the vessel on return from attending trawls. Their names are Henry Burke, John Hayes, Archie McDonald and Bernard Glenn.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.

John O. Evans, President of the Mutual Union Telegraph Company, and a prominent Eastern capitalist, died this morning, aged 44 years.

ASHLAND, Ky., Dec. 25.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Gibbons, who reside near here, were visiting on Friday night, leaving their daughter, 14 years old, Miss Emma Thomas, 17 years old, and their son Robert Gibbons, at the Gibbons homestead. During the night some villains went to the house, outraged both girls, saturated their clothing with oil, set the house on fire and killed young Robert Gibbons, who attempted to give the alarm. They had their heads split open with a hatchet. No clue to the murderers.

COLLEGE POINT, L. I., Dec. 24.

Edward Hoppe, an old and respected resident, this morning murdered his wife and then committed suicide. Dependency caused by excessive drink was the cause of the act.

BOSTON, Dec. 24.

A cable to the Herald says articles were signed, £100 a side staked to-night for a match on the Tyne, April 3, between Hanlan and Boyd for £500 a side. Hanlan is allowed £50 for expenses.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.

A World's London despatch says: "The English Government has determined to break up the Ladies' Land League, which has perfected its methods of agitation and is as formidable as Parnell was. There are now 350 prominent Irishmen in jail, lying there, of course, without trial, but the tale of agrarian outrages does not decrease, although there are now, counting constabulary with military, 50,000 armed men in the country. The daily story of outrage and murder and Ministerial incapacity is read with a feeling of intense weariness in this country, and the Premier may look for many bad quarters of an hour when Parliament meets."

QUEENSTOWN, Dec. 35.

The steamer "Catalonia" collided with the British barque "Helenslee," from San Francisco for Queenstown, in the harbor today. The "Helenslee" sank and nine of the crew were drowned, the remaining sixteen being saved by the "Catalonia." The latter had bows stove in.

EUROPEAN.

WARSAW, Dec. 25.

During the celebration of High Mass in the Church of the Holy Cross, a man was seized while picking pockets. In order to effect his escape the culprit cried "Fire!" "Fire!" Immediately a great panic seized the congregation who rushed for the door. During the confusion twelve women were crushed to death, and many other persons seriously injured. The pickpocket was soundly beaten by the crowd. The culprit is a Jew. The lower class of people are much excited against his co-religionists, several of whom have been maltreated and the windows of their dwellings broken. The military had to be called out.

So far thirty persons have died of injuries received during the panic. Four shops kept by Jews were completely gutted. Several policemen were injured by rioters. The authorities displayed great promptitude in repressing disorder. The military are patrolling the disturbed quarters.

TABREEZ, Dec. 25.

The Persian Government has requested Ayoub Khan, Afghan Chief, residing at Ghayn, either to quit Persia or go to Meshed.

HAVRE, Dec. 24.

The enormous speculative operations in coffee, thus far, have resulted in losses estimated at one million pounds.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 25.

Through the influence of Mr. Fawcett, British Consul-General here, and some influential friends, partition has been granted O'Donovan, the correspondent of the London "Daily News," who was sentenced to six months imprisonment for speaking in abuse of the terms of the Sultan. O'Donovan will leave the city to-morrow.

The Bank of Montreal has sold up to date \$2,000,000 worth of Canada Pacific railway grant bonds.

Four hundred persons are believed to have lost their lives by the recent accident to a dam in Algiers.

Nearly two hundred lives have been lost by a colliery explosion at Bolton, Lancashire.

Two cases of revolvers have been seized by the police at the railway station at Limerick.
