Our Schools.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE AND NORMAL SCHOOL.

The Superintendent of Education supplies the following statistics of the Prince of Wales College and Normal School:—

Table with 2 columns: Term and Attendance. Rows include 1879-1880 first term (75), 1880-1881 first (78), 1880-1881 second (108), 1881-1882 first (130), 1881-1882 second (121), 1882-1883 first (121), 1882-1883 second (53).

During the term ended December, 1882, there were in attendance 93 students, as follows:—

The Superintendent continues:—

I have frequently called attention to the inadequate accommodation provided for the College and Normal School. The Teachers make the best use of the space at their disposal, but they are cramped on every hand from want of room. I hope, therefore, that Parliament will vote a sum sufficient to erect a new building for the Provincial College and Normal School.

No appropriation of public money would benefit so many, and benefit them to such an extent, as an appropriation for this purpose. On an average, about 150 students, yearly, attend the Prince of Wales College from all parts of the Island. Two-thirds of these qualify themselves for the teaching profession.

The buildings, therefore, the apparatus, the furniture, should all be of the most approved kind. The premises also should be suitably arranged. The grounds belonging to the College are sufficiently large, and very little means would be required to make them suitable for purposes of discipline and practical gymnastics.

All that I have enumerated, the building itself, its internal equipment, the opportunity for regular and concerted movements, well-furnished and well-ventilated rooms, suitable and well-ordered walks and grounds for physical exercise, have an educating influence which should not be overlooked.

The College has done good service in the cause of education. In fact, the well-merited acknowledgment of the splendid services it has rendered and still continues, with increasing efficiency, to render, had averted public attention from the necessity of increased accommodation until recently. It is the result of its own work that is now overcrowding the College. It is now supplied from the schools which it had furnished with teachers, and the demand for more and better accommodation becomes more and more urgent as the work of the College extends and bears fruit.

In his Report Principal Anderson says:—

The Scholarship-examination, which was held in August, was decidedly in advance of that of 1880. Seventy-eight candidates entered, representing nearly all parts of the Province. Thirty-six gained 300 marks out of a possible 600. The Examination consisted of papers in English, Latin, Mathematics, Arithmetic, History and Geography. It was intentionally harder than on the last occasion, yet fourteen gained sixty-six per cent. or upwards of the attainable marks, while three—Lea, (Grapaud), Mellish, (New Perth), and Sutherland, (Montague), secured over eighty per cent. But though these results are gratifying, there are certain points to which I would invite attention. Greater precision must be attained in answering questions; better methods ought to be adopted in the solution of Arithmetical exercises, and practice in Map-drawing ought always to accompany instruction in Geography, while the Penmanship might, without much difficulty, be greatly improved, and Spelling reach a higher degree of accuracy.

I have, as usual, to report the success of many who were our students, but have proceeded to other Institutions of learning to prosecute their studies. It is satisfactory to see that the credit of the Prince of Wales is being maintained with such assiduity and ability by Messrs. J. P. McLeod, T. Haythorne, L. Gregor, W. Dixon, J. M. McLeod, and many others; and I trust that the distinctions that have been won by our students in the years that have passed, may prove an incentive and encouragement to the talented and industrious young men, who may now, or in future years be their successors in this Institution.

One honor, I think, deserves special mention. On no previous occasion had any of our students sought admission to the Royal Military College. It is very gratifying to find, that, in the Examination held last June, Mr. H. Sloggett gained the first place.

The coronation of the Czar will bring to light some curious and ancient works of art which are only seen at long intervals. The nucleus of the Russian regalia is Byzantine, and of great antiquity. It was sent by the Greek Emperor Constantine Monomachos to Kiev in 1114 by the hands of the Archbishop of Ephesus and the Bishops of Mytilene and of Antioch. Of this original treasure, first used at the coronation of Valdimir Vsevolodovitch, the grandson of St. Valdimir, several portions are said to exist unimpaired; in particular, a jewelled cross, a bowl of gold inlaid with mother of pearl which is said to have belonged to the Roman Emperor Augustus, and the imperial coronet of the autocrats of Russia. The modern regalia of Russia, in the midst of which the beauty of these barbaric objects will be lost is said to possess no great artistic value.

The purchase of the Suez Canal shares by Earl Beaconsfield was a standing joke against that statesman for years. From every point of view it was denounced. It could not be utilized. The purchase was too costly. Its traffic would be monopolized by other nations, and so forth. Time changed public opinion, and we now find Earl Granville, the Liberal Foreign Secretary, stating that the canal is not large enough for the enormous traffic that is passing through it, and that the tonnage of the shipping which uses it is increasing at a rate which exceeds the most sanguine expectations ever formed respecting it, and, therefore, he views with favor the proposal to build a supplementary canal.

Liquor License Bill.

SYNOPSIS OF THE MEASURE BEFORE THE COMMONS.—DEFINITION OF TERMS USED IN THE ACT.—THE PROPOSED POWERS OF COMMISSIONERS AND INSPECTORS.

The Liquor License Act was introduced into the House of Commons on the 14th. The following synopsis will show the general features of the bill:—First—District means a license district. Second—Elector means those who are entitled to vote at an election for a member of the House of Commons. Third—Inspector means an inspector of licensed premises and includes every person having the authority of such inspector. Fourth—Hotel license means a license authorizing the holder thereof to sell and dispense any liquor in quantities not exceeding one quart, which may be drunk on the premises. Fifth—License means a person holding a license under this Act. Sixth—Licensed premises means the premises in respect of which a license under the Act has been granted, is in force, and shall be construed to mean and extend to every room, closet and cellar, yard, stable, outhouse, shed, or any other place whatsoever, belonging to or in any manner appertaining to such house or place. Seventh—Liquor or liquor shall be construed to mean and comprehend all spirituous and malt liquors, and all combinations of liquors and drinks and drinkable liquids which are in existence. Eighth—Public bar or bar means and includes any room, passage, or lobby in any licensed premises that open immediately to any street, highway, public place, or public thoroughfare where the public may enter and purchase liquors. Ninth—Saloon license means a license authorizing the holder thereof to sell and dispose of any liquors not exceeding one quart on the premises therein specified, and may be drunk on the premises. Nothing in this Act shall apply, first, to any apothecary, chemist, or druggist who may administer or sell any spirituous, distilled, or fermented liquors for medicinal purposes provided he shall not be permitted to sell more than six ounces at any one time, except under certificate from a registered medical practitioner, except "methylated alcohol" or oil of whiskey, or other medicine for cattle and horses. Second—To manufacturers of native wines from grapes grown and produced in Canada, and who sell such wines in quantities of not less than one gallon, or two bottles of not less than three half pints each, at one time. Third—To any person who holds a license as auctioneer, selling liquor at public auction in quantities of not less than two gallons at any one time. Fourth—To any person selling liquor in any refreshment-room, at the Senate or House of Commons, or the Legislative Council or House of Assembly of any of the Provinces, by the permission and under the control of the Senate, House of Commons, Legislative Council, or House of Assembly, respectively. Fifth—To any military cautions established by law.

LICENSE DISTRICTS.

The Governor-in-Council shall, as soon as conveniently may be after the commencement of this Act, establish districts for the purposes of this Act, to be called "License Districts," when so defined, and when altered, shall be announced by proclamation in the Canada Gazette. Such districts shall, as far as possible and convenient, be identical and coterminous with existing and future, first, counties; second, or electoral districts; third, or cities.

LICENSE COMMISSIONERS.

There shall be a board of license commissioners, to be called "The Board," composed of three persons for each license district. First—The commissioners shall be (a) in the provinces of Ontario, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, and Prince Edward Island, the County Court judge or the junior judge of the county as may be selected by the Governor-in-Council. In the province of Quebec, the Superior Court judge of the judicial district except in the cities of Montreal and Quebec, where it shall be the judge or the Sessions of the Peace. In the Province of British Columbia, such of the judges as the Governor-in-Council may appoint. Second—In the counties of Chicoutimi, Gaspé, Bonaventure, in the province of Quebec, the Governor-in-Council may appoint two commissioners who, with the warden, shall form the board, and in any re-organized district the Governor-in-Council may appoint three commissioners. Third—The judge shall be the chairman of the board, and two of the said commissioners shall form a quorum. In the absence of the judge, the warden, or mayor, as the case may be, and in Prince Edward Island the sheriff, shall be the chairman. In the event of a tie the chairman shall have an additional or casting vote.

LICENSE INSPECTORS.

An inspector to be called the chief inspector of licenses and one or more sub-inspectors shall be appointed by the Board of License Commissioners from time to time for each district as the board may see fit, and each license inspector shall, before entering upon his duties, give such security as the board may require for the due performance of all his said duties and for the payment over of all sums of money received by him according to the provisions of this Act, and the salary of the inspectors shall be fixed by the board subject to the approval of the Governor-in-Council. Second—The security required by this section shall be by bond to her Majesty. Third—The chief license inspector shall be the secretary-treasurer of the board, and all moneys payable to the board shall be paid to him.

BOARD OF LICENSE COMMISSIONERS.

Every license shall be issued by the authority and under the direction of the Board of License Commissioners for the district to which the license is to apply in situ, except in the case of licenses for vessels, which may be issued under the authority of the board for any district to or from any port in which the vessel sails, or at any port in which she sails. The Board of License Commissioners may, at any time before the first day of May in each year, pass a resolution or resolutions for regulating and determining the matters following, that is to say:—

1. For defining the conditions and qualifications requisite to obtain hotel licenses for the retail, within the district or any part thereof, of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors, and also shop licenses for the sale by retail within the district, or any part thereof, of such liquors in shops or places other than hotels, taverns,

inns, alehouses, beerhouses, or places of public entertainment not contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act. 2. For limiting the number of hotel and saloon licenses respectively within the maximum prescribed by this Act, and for defining the respective times and localities within which, and the persons to whom, such limited number may be issued within the year from the 1st day of May of one year till the 30th day of April inclusive of the next year. 3. For declaring the number of saloon licenses that may be issued in any year. 4. For regulating the hotels, saloons, and shops to be licensed. 5. For fixing and defining the duties, powers, and privileges of the inspector of licenses of their district.

Obituary.

The many friends and acquaintances of Rev. C. D. McLarren in this city, and throughout the Maritime Provinces will regret to hear of his unexpected demise in a foreign country. Mr. McLarren took an arts course at Dalhousie College, and in 1879 completed his studies in this city. He afterwards left for the United States where he received his Theological training, and last November was appointed a Missionary to Bangkok, Siam, by the United Presbyterian Church of United States. Early in March Mr. McLarren left his station at Bangkok in a boat to visit a neighboring station, but before arriving at his destination he was called to see a sick seaman on board a vessel. While in company with the sick man, who had the cholera, he placed one of his hands on the latter's forehead, and it is supposed that by this means his sickness was contracted, as he was attacked with bilious dysentery shortly afterwards. On the 13th of the month he expired, and was buried with the British flag around his coffin. Shortly before leaving for his field of labor Mr. McLarren married a Halifax lady, and it is through her that the news of her husband's death has reached the city, the Rev. Burns receiving a letter yesterday. The circumstances of the case are peculiarly sad and the friend of the deceased will lament that so valuable a promoter of the interests of the gospel had been stricken down at his post of duty while laboring in a foreign clime.—Halifax Herald.

The Rev. Mr. McLarren was a native of St. Peter's, P. E. I. Only last summer after completing his Theological studies in the United States, and previous to his departure as a Missionary to Siam, he paid his Island home a visit, and was warmly welcomed by his numerous friends. He was of a kindly disposition, an earnest and sincere Christian, an enthusiastic Missionary of the Cross, and it is sad to think that such a one as he should be cut down in the very spring-time of his life.

For Death did wait for him; And, in the stranger's land, had laid him low. Yet, grieve not, unconsol'd. 'Tis but the form Is dead; 'th' unconquer'd spirit still doth live."

We tender his friends and relatives our sincere sympathy in their bereavement.
