

# Improvement For Saskatoon Seen In Decision By CNR

SASKATOON (CP) — Saskatoon will get a major face-lift as a result of the Canadian National Railway's decision to remove its truckage from the downtown business area.

The decision to remove the tracks which came after several months of intensive negotiations between the railway and the city, will clear a 32.5-acre site in the heart of the city. Six acres will be set aside for roads and utilities with the balance available for commercial development.

First step in the \$7,000,000-plus project is development of a CNR road-bed and facilities just west of Saskatoon at Chapel. Work on this phase is to start this year.

Trackage from the downtown site then will be lifted and the area prepared for development.

Work on this phase is expected to begin in 1954 or 1955 with the redevelopment of the cleared area scheduled to be under way in 1957.

**BILL PASSED**

Cost to the city is \$2,700,000 and a special bill was adopted at the spring session of the Saskatchewan legislature, giving its blessing to a city plan to borrow the necessary funds.

Removal of the tracks has thrown open the door for a host of development possibilities. City planners are talking about such things as underground parking, covered pedestrian walks, parks and playground

What will eventually be erected on the site, however, remains in the hands of the CNR. While it is possible the corporation will sell the property, it is more likely it will be leased to a developer on a long-term basis.

Immediate effect of the plans to clear the area will be a slight slowing down of commercial property transactions. Real estate agents generally say property holders will adopt a wait-and-see attitude until development of the site is under way.

The move to clear the site

was sparked by a \$24,000,000 city traffic report which outlined Saskatoon's road, bridge and overpass needs for the next 20 years. Much of the expenditure was directly related to weaving traffic over and under the CNR tracks.
