Fernando Winch's Donat King, a California invader, who surprised by winning Aqueduct's \$200,000 Champagne Stakes last fall, makes his 1962 debut in the six furlong Swift. Although idle since finishing second last year to Crimmon Saint in the King State Stakes, he still is the favorite under the \$25,000 odds of Jockey Manuel Yanes.

Two other good stakes colts, Townsend B. Martin's Sunrise County and Mrs. Adela L. Brax's Green Trick, also were named for the Swift.

An Alcohol Education Conference will be held at the Charlottetown Hotel on March 30 and 31, sponsored by the division of alcohol studies of the department of education.

Guest speaker will be C. K. Aharan, director of the London, Ont. Branch of the Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Research Foundation.

Alcohol studies division director David Bowtell said this morning that in addition to Mr. Aharan, "we will use our own provincial resource people, some of whom are very knowledgeable in the alcohol problem."

Members Of Credit Union Vote Dissolution Of Group

Members of the Fellowship Credit Union of Trinity United Church unanimously decided last night at their annual meeting to dissolve their organization.

A motion was accepted to the effect that the credit union be liquidated under the fund stabilization program, one of three ways in which the credit union could dissolve. It was decided that the president, Lester Kelly, who presided at the meeting, and the treasurer, David Murphy, would be in charge of the liquidation.

The ways in which the credit union could dissolve were outlined by Reginald MacCarville, manager of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League.

Mr. MacCarville stated that the members could transfer membership to the Charlottetown Credit Union and go on as if nothing had happened or they could dissolve under the stabilization fund program or the voluntary liquidation process.

He explained that in the stabilization process the stabilization board would take over all assets and liabilities of the organization, a balance sheet would be drawn up and given to the registrar of credit unions.

Members Of Credit Union Vote Dissolution Of Group

A notice would be printed in the Royal Gazette to the effect that the credit union has dissolved and a cheque would be sent to each shareholder. All outstanding loans would have to be collected, he pointed out.

The voluntary method, he said, was a long drawn out process, requiring the signature of approximately 75 per cent of the members, stating that they want the credit union to be dissolved.

He stated that a waiting period of three months was required before payment to the shareholders could be made, in order that shareholders be advised of the dissolving of the organization.

He observed that in order for the shareholders to be paid, all loans must be paid or there would have to be enough cash on hand to pay them.

It was stated by Mr. Murphy, who had the treasurer's report, "hasn't achieved what we would like to see. I don't know why we should carry on."

A one-time high membership of 100 was reported to 44, it was stated.

The treasurer's report indicated that the group was down to \$4,679.94 while on the liability side there amounted to \$5,792.77. Interest as of Sept. 30, 1961 was \$20.75. Total expenditures were \$202.72 while the net income was \$60.00.

It was decided that 2 1/2 per cent would be paid on share capital for the year ending September, 1961.

All officers whose terms expired were re-elected.

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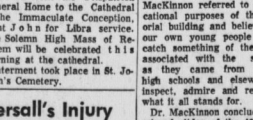
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Carl Brewer Has Operation
