

# Russia Causing Concern With Ships' Naval Role

LONDON (AP) — The Soviet Union is causing concern among Western defense organizations by using more and more of its merchant ships in a naval role, says Jane's Fighting Ships.

It says the United States, however, is still the world's greatest sea power and predicted that the Royal Navy, once the ruler of the waves, will cease to exist except as a minor force unless new vessels are built soon.

Japan is described as a rearguard sea power in the Far East.

The authoritative British publication on the world's navies singles out Soviet trawlers, frequently accused by the West of carrying out spy operations off shore. It says the "ubiquitous" Russian fishing boats "seem to appear on every trade route and

on every scene of naval activity." "There is no doubt that the U.S.S.R. regards her merchant shipping fleet not only as an essential element of the national economy at all times, but as a vital fourth arm of defence in emergencies."

**CAUSES CONCERN**

"It is not only the growth of Soviet merchant shipping which is of some concern to the principal maritime powers. The chiefs of the NATO, SEATO and CENTO (Western defence) organizations are tending to think not specifically about the Soviet naval forces proper, but broadly about all the U.S.S.R.'s sea vehicles."

Jane's says the Soviet navy has concentrated recently on production of missile-firing destroyers, anti-submarine frigates and nuclear-powered submarines.

It says the Soviet naval strength now is estimated at 22 cruisers, 150 destroyers, 35 nuclear powered submarines, 300 conventional powered submarines, 100 frigates and 700 minesweepers.

Smaller Soviet craft include 250 escort and patrol vessels,

350 motor torpedo boats, 550 motor gunboats, 150 landing craft, 300 auxiliaries and 300 service vessels.

Jane's says that by comparison the United States Navy is still by far the greatest in the world.

**PLAN SECOND CARRIER**

A second U.S. nuclear-powered aircraft carrier is to be built, it says, and "U.S. Navy chiefs can be expected to press for a new aircraft carrier per year, preferably nuclear powered, from now on."

According to the latest schedule the U.S. Navy will by 1970 have a fleet of 100 nuclear submarines, including 41 armed with Polaris ballistic missiles, it says.

Jane's lists the current strength of the U.S. Navy as including 27 attack and support aircraft carriers, eight amphibious assault ships (carriers), seven auxiliary aircraft transport (carriers), 15 aircraft ferry ships (carriers) 40 battleships, two command ships, 40 leaders, 300 destroyers, 10 destroyer minelayers, 70 destroyers escorts, 60 nuclear submarines and 140 conventional submarines.

# Quebec Reorted Slipping In Pulp And Paper Industry

QUEBEC (CP) — The Quebec Council of Pulp and Paper Producers said here Quebec has slipped in world importance as a manufacturer of pulp and paper despite a production rise.

The council asked the provincial government to take such considerations into account in drawing up any new legislation governing Quebec's forest resources.

The council, which represents 17 producers operating in the province, made its statements in a brief presented at a public hearing held by the department of lands and forests.

# Ike, Monty Friction Is Subject Of Film

WASHINGTON (Reuters) — Friction between the supreme Allied commander, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, and Britain's Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery became so bad during the battle of the Ardennes in 1944 that of proposing that one of them should go, according to a film scenario said to be based on the recollections of Montgomery's chief of staff.

The Washington Post publishes an interview with Anthony Lazzarino, producer of the projected film, on the repulse of the desperate German offensive in the Ardennes in the winter of 1944.

Lazzarino claimed that Maj. Gen. Sir Francis (Freddie) Gueund, then Montgomery's chief of staff, wrote part of the scenario which showed how he tried to prevent a break between the two generals in their dispute over the control of ground forces.

The scenario quotes Eisenhower as telling Gueund at his Versailles headquarters: "You know Freddie, I just can't understand Monty. You think something is discussed and settled and then he starts off again on the same track. This time I'm afraid it's reached such a serious stage that I've decided to refer the whole business to (Gen. George) Marshall and the combined chiefs of staff."

Eisenhower said his problems with Montgomery boiled down to the field marshal contending that things would have gone better for the Allies "if he had been in over-all command."

The Post says the film will be made by Columbia Pictures Association. Spokesmen for the company were not immediately available for comment, nor were Lazzarino or Eisenhower.
