

Resident-General Wants Self-Rule For Morocco

PARIS (AP)—Leaders of the uneasy French North African empire gathered in Paris Wednesday for a decision on the fate of Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat, pet of the turbulent Moroccan Nationalists.

Ben Moulay Arafat, a pious, inflexible old gentleman with a little goatee, was installed two years ago. He replaced Mohammed Ben Youssef, who has become a symbol to the Nationalists in his exile on Madagascar.

On August 20 it will be two years since the French government and conservative Moroccan forces decided to flee the country. Bloody riots are expected on the anniversary date unless some decision is made by the anniversary date.

COMMITTEE TO MEET

Thursday the French government's North African coordinating committee met in the offices

of Premier Edgar Faure. He and his top ministers attended, as well as top officials of France in North Africa.

The star of the occasion was expected to be Gilt-rt Grandval, resident-general in Morocco, who arrived in Paris Wednesday. The way things are now, he is the ruler of the 8,000,000 Moroccans and 500,000 Europeans in the French zone.

But he would like to change all that. He wants to oust Ben Moulay Arafat, install a regency and a Moroccan government with real powers that would point the way to home rule that French has recently granted Tunisia. Those who support him—including Premier Faure—believe that would steal the thunder from the Nationalists.

CONSERVATIVES OPPOSED

Conservative Frenchmen and Moroccans, however, maintain the

Moroccans are not prepared for self-government and will do better under close French tutelage.

Pressure has been brought on Grandval to down his recommendations, which are said to be opposed by such prominent members as Foreign Minister Pierre Koenig.

Meanwhile, Nationalist terrorism has been relatively inactive in Morocco, apparently waiting for the next move from Paris.

Valleyfield Braves To Quit Play For One Year

MONTREAL (CP)—Valleyfield Braves of the Quebec Hockey League will withdraw from action for one season for financial reasons, Braves president Arthur Viwet announced Tuesday.

Viwet said it is hoped the Braves will be in action again for the 1956-57 season.

The Valleyfield withdrawal reduces the league to four teams. It started last year with six—Ottawa, Chicoutimi, Montreal, Quebec, Shawinigan Falls and Valleyfield, but Ottawa pulled out early in the season.

There have been frequent reports of Valleyfield's financial difficulty. Viwet said attempts failed to form a syndicate to pull the team over the current rough period.

Viwet announced the move in a telephone call from the office of Tom Blake, new coach of Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

Still Rates Jack Dempsey Best Of All

ROME, (AP)—Former world heavyweight champion Gene Tunney rates Rocky Marciano as a "great fighter," but he still says Jack Dempsey was "the best of them all."

Nor is he greatly impressed by the present crop of challengers to Marciano.

"I haven't seen anything outstanding among the new heavyweights," he said.

The only man to whip Jack Dempsey twice, once after the famous 1927 Chicago "long count" is 37 now, but looks 10 years younger. Tunney is here with his family, sightseeing.

It was his first visit to Rome in 25 years. He was married to Polly Lauder, of the steel family, here in 1928, a year after he defeated Dempsey before 105,000 people at Soldier Field.

Supervised Long-Distance Swims Seen Not Harmful

MONTREAL (CP)—Three Montreal medical authorities said Monday that properly supervised long-distance swims should do no harm to healthy persons.

Their comment followed the reported condemnation of marathon swimmers by Alderman William Allen of Toronto. After 19-year-old Shirley Campbell of Fergus, Ont., failed to complete a swim across Lake Ontario last week, the alderman was quoted as saying distance swims are "barbaric and criminal."

He called for cancellation of the Canadian National Exhibition marathon swim.

Dr. Arnold Jones, swimming adviser to the Quebec Red Cross, said the alderman's suggestion was "sort of silly" because there is no need for a ban if swimmers are properly prepared physically for the effort.

CAREFULLY CHECK FIRST

Dr. F. Munroe Bourne, heart specialist, who swam in the 100-

and 200-metre sprints for Canada in the 1923, 1932 and 1936 Olympic games, said swim marathons should not harm the heart if contestants are carefully checked beforehand and found entirely healthy.

Dr. Everett Crutchlow, who looks after McGill University's swimming team, said "the business about grueling swims hurting the heart was exploded long ago."

"It's like the fuss about so-called athlete's heart developing from over-work," he said. "There has been no evidence of permanent harm to the heart from such efforts."

Commodore C. L. G. Evans had been reprimanding the sailor last week for deserting when Stevens flung the cap at him striking his commanding officer's peaked cap.

Today's court martial was held aboard the victory, the wooden man-of-war which once served as Nelson's flagship.

Defence counsel apologized on behalf of the young sailor for the incident and said Stevens had nothing against the commodore personally but flung his cap at him as "a gesture against naval life in general."
