Play Presented At Sea View

The fast moving three-act comedy, "A Ready-made Family," was presented by the Kensington Presbyterian Young Adult Club, at Sea View Hall, on Monday evening, June 12th.

All the elements for a ready-made family were certainly at hand, for "Agnes Martyn," a widow, played by Bessie Heckbert, who is about to marry "Henry Turner," a widower, (J. A. McGowan) has no less than three children, "Bob" (Blair Heeschen) "Mirilee" (Glady's Semple) and "Gracie" (Ruth Thompson) as well as a sister-in-law, "Miss Lydia" (Marion Lockhart). Add "Henry Turner's" daughter, Doris (Jean MacLeod) and son "Sammy" (Wallace Thompson) and it was quite a family when they all got together.

But to get them together is the difficulty, for Mrs. Martyn's family is quite sure the widower is after their mother's money, and Henry Turner's daughter and son are equally sure the widow has her eye on the legacy their father is about to receive, so they go to great lengths to stop the marriage.

Mr. Turner suffers considerable punishment at the hands of the Martyns, who pretend great affection, but find ways to keep him in constant distress, both mental and physical. They are aided and abetted by Aunt Lydia, and also by "Bessie," their colored cook (Glady's Semple) and "Neddemus," the colored handyman (Fred Semple), but the Turner children do very well by themselves when they turn up unexpectedly, and give the widow and her family the impression that they are undesirable as a step-family.

However, the parents play a trick or two on the children, making them decide that the marriage is desirable after all, and each family finds the other to be very likable and intelligent, when they re-assume their natural personalities.

It would be difficult to pick any one actor or actress as outstanding, as each part was well chosen and well acted. However, it might be said that Marion Lockhart assumed the rather difficult role of the somewhat gloomy Aunt Lydia, very realistically, and that Rev. Mr. McGowan gave an excellent impersonation of a harassed and perplexed potential step-father.

Mrs. Thompson gave a very convincing (especially to Papa Turner) interpretation of a brat, which "Gracie" pretended to be, to help prevent the marriage.

Blair Heeschen as "Bob" put on an expert act, and Fred Semple as "Neddemus" portrayed a variety of emotions, very effectively. Mrs. Dunning as "Bessie" had her feelings too, but was somewhat less emotional, rather playing the role of one upon whom the family leaned.

Equally important in the well balanced performance, if slightly less spectacular, were Mrs. Heckbert, playing the charming widow, Mrs. Semple as "Mirilee" and Jean MacLeod as "Doris", both lovely young ladies, when they stop trying to discourage prospective step-parents, and "Sammy" an upstanding young man except for a brief interval.

The specialties were also highly entertaining and amusing. A solo by Mr. Parmenas Phillips featured as "Uncle Joe" a very dressed-up dandy, and a duet in costume, by Mrs. Reagh Sudsbury and Mrs. Horace Painter were vigorously applauded and the singers responded with equally well received encores.

West-German authorities are turning a cold shoulder toward Marshal Tito's bid for \$100,000,000 worth of economic aid, authoritative sources said today. Tito is seeking the credit to help fight the Communist economic blockade of Yugoslavia.

MONTREAL, June 29 — (CP)
