A PORT HAWKESBURY despatch says: The brigantine Aldwych, Captain Wetmore, of Alton, P. E. Island, loaded with salt from Turk's Island, while going out on Wednesday mistimed and ran aground at Lechan's Point, near Port Hastings. She was floated at high tide same day without sustaining damage.

THIS morning an application was heard before the Chief Justice for a rule nisi for a certiorari to quash the assessment and warrant issued against John Griffith for personal property tax for the year 1885. The rule was granted by His Lordship, and made returnable before the full Court in January next.

THE steamer Worcester, Capt. Allen, sailed for Boston yesterday afternoon, with a cargo consisting of 1129 bags and barrels potatoes and turnips, 707 cases of eggs, 922 cases canned lobsters, 100 cases canned meats, 33 barrels mackerel, 5 barrels glue stock and sundry other mdse. Mrs. J. Lyons was the only passenger.

THE Yarmouth, N. S., Herald says:—A little boy, 4 or 5 years of age, a son of Mr. Desire Cotreau, of Tusket, was drowned in a well on from home, having left his mother in his father's care. Mr. C. went to a neighbor's with the boy, and the latter returned and made for the well, into which he fell and was drowned.

THE total exports of Canada to Europe from the opening of navigation to date were 13,888,891 bushels, divided as follows: 5,878,891 bushels wheat, 3,963,384 corn, 2,072,624 peas, 1,657,121 oats, 13,925 rye and 509 barley. The European exports amount to 499,345 sacks of flour and 79,907 oatmeal. The exports of live stock last week were 1369 cattle and 6738 sheep. Total exports of live stock 8107 bushels.

Canadian Notes.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25. E. Morin, druggist, has assigned. His liabilities are \$8,000, assets \$3,000. Morin has been in business five months.

W. Reed, bailiff, has disappeared. He was behind in his remittance of money collected in his official capacity.

P. Laurent, contractor, who fell from a building on Tuesday, died to-day.

Fire in Boston.

Boston, Nov. 25. Early this evening, a fire started in the upper stories of a sash and blind factory on Friend Street. The factory was a six story brick building. By the time the firemen arrived on the scene, the upper stories were burning fiercely and in a short time those stories were completely gutted. The damage will not exceed \$10,000. During the progress of the fire, a number of firemen who had entered the burning structure were suffocated, this resulted fatally in but one case.

WEST NEW BRIGHTON, L. I., Nov. 25. Erastus Brooks died at his residence on Clove Road to-day.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 25. Francis Palms, one of the oldest and wealthiest citizens of this city, died this morning. He leaves an estate worth from \$15,000,000 to \$18,000,000.

Anarchists Executions.

BLOOMINGTON, Ills., Nov. 25. Judge Scott granted superseades in the Anarchists case this morning. The effect of the Judge's order will be to stay the execution, at least, until the full bench of the supreme court has passed upon the questions raised for a trial.

Financial.

LONDON, Nov. 25. The Bank of England lost \$135,000 on balance to-day. Bullion in the bank has decreased \$95,000 during the past week, making proportion of banks reserve to liability 44, 11, 16 per cent. against 42, 7, 16, last week.

Conspiracy.

SOPIA, Nov. 25. Another conspiracy against the Government has been discovered. Two officers of a Russian organization plotted to kill Col. Nicoloeff, Major Papoff and the Regent, the crime was to have been committed at 5 o'clock this morning.

Salvation Army.

QUEBEC, Nov. 25. The Salvation Army are about to open their campaign in St. Sauveur. The Fathers of this parish have warned their hearers to stay away from the meetings.

Fatal Stabbing.

BOSTON, Nov. 25. Emile Kemp fatally stabbed G. H. Emmons during an altercation at their boarding house late to-night.

Increasing Exports.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25. The exports for last October exceeded the previous October by over one million dollars.

Explosion.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25. A tug boat has exploded in East River, killing four men.
