

Sudden Death Yesterday Of Mr. Roy Mills

The death occurred suddenly in the city yesterday of Mr. Roy Mills age 38, following a seizure while he was engaged at work with a bridge and building gang in the Canadian National Railway yard. Mr. Mills, a veteran of World War II, was taken ill with a heart attack shortly before noon and died in an ambulance as he was being rushed to the hospital for emergency treatment. He left the island during the war with the 8th Seige Battery and served for the duration. The late Mr. Mills is survived by his wife, the former Ethel Hill of Mayfield, and three children, Gordon, Heather and Patsy. Another son, Barry, predeceased him two years ago. Island Holstein Is Gold Seal Producer

Only two Holsteins from the Maritime Provinces have ever completed lifetime records in excess of 175,000 pounds of milk. The first of these was Jean Abbeker Pontiac who in 1936 established a lifetime total of 186,745 pounds of milk and 7088 pounds of fat in the herd of W. R. Boyer, Charlottetown. Now Jean's grand-daughter, Seaside Susie Abbeker has completed an eleven lactation twice-a-day milking lifetime total of 178,919 pounds of milk, containing 6230 pounds of fat average test 3.48 per cent butterfat. She thus qualifies for a Gold Seal certificate of Longtime Production presented by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada for all records in excess of 175,000 pounds of milk.

Susie made her eleventh record as a thirteen-year-old and is now back on test again and producing at a rate that will put her over the 200,000 pound mark in her current lactation. Five of her 11 lactations were made on the 305 day division and all of them were

on twice-a-day milking. She started on official Record of Performance test as a Senior Yearling and is now in her fourteenth year. The breeder and owner of Susie is Walter Buntain and Son, Rustico, P.E.I. A paternal sister of Susie in the herd of Granville S. Buntain, Rustico, is Riverlea Jean Pontiac with a Silver Seal lifetime production in ten lactations of 150,150 pounds of milk containing 5696 pounds of fat. A full sister of Susie before going to Mexico produced a bull that sired Norma Marie Pontiac who has been classified as Excellent, the highest rating attainable for conformation and has many times been Grand Champion at Maritime Fairs for Colby C. Lewis, Preetown, P.E.I. Susie's largest individual record was made as a ten-year-old when she produced in 365 days 21,099 pounds of milk, containing 735 pounds fat. She also exceeded the 20,000 pound mark as a seven-year-old giving 20,179 pounds of milk and 684 pounds fat.

C.N.S. Sailings From Halifax
