WONDERS OF THE OCEAN. Careful scientific experiments prove that at the depth of three miles ocean waters exert a pressure equal to one ton to the square inch.

The Red Sea is so called because its surface is literally covered with minute crimson organisms, the waters of which are as clear as crystal and of a bright hue.

A spot near the Friendly Islands, latitude 24 degrees 37 minutes south; longitude 173 degrees 5 minutes west, is 25 feet more than the five English miles in depth.

Dr. Schmitt, the German hydrographer, says that there are not less than 20,000,000 tons of water in the Red Sea, which is 25 feet more than the five English miles in depth.
