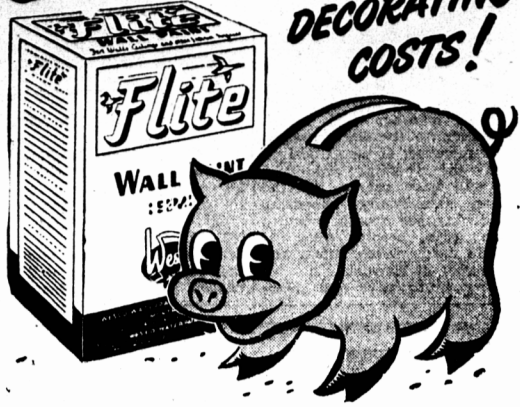

St. Laurent Ready To Move Into New Home Today

OTTAWA, May 1 — (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent joins his fellow Canadians today in the traditional May - moving day — in occupying a new home.

He and Mrs. St. Laurent will formally take up residence at No. 24 Sussex Street, site of a gracious and dignified mansion which Canada is providing as an official home for her prime ministers.

The three-storey house sits on four acres of treed ground atop a limestone cliff and overlooking the broad sweep of the picturesque Ottawa River. Appropriately, the Prime Minister will have a neighbor, the Governor-General, whose official residence — Rideau Hall — is across the road.

Originally the home of the late Gordon C. Edwards, old-time Ottawa Valley lumber king, it was purchased by the government and converted and furnished at a cost of approximately \$500,000. While the state normally would pay all costs of upkeep, Mr. St. Laurent has insisted on paying \$5,000 a year towards the household bills.

Actually, Mr. and Mrs. St. Laurent have been living in their new home since the week-end. They moved in quietly Saturday. However, their lease on their uptown apartment does not expire until tomorrow, when they formally become the first residents of the prime ministerial home.

Semi-private and private rates vary, the patient paying the extra charge. At the Vancouver General semi-private ward rates are \$1 to \$2 a day above the public ward. Private ward rates range from \$4.00 to \$5.00 higher.

The ward rates include certain medical services which prior to hospital insurance cost the patient extra.

Annual Meeting Spring Stock Show and Sale

AMHERST, N. S., May 1 — (CP) — Introduction of a new exhibit class was the highlight of the annual meeting of the Maritime Spring Stock Show and Sale Association here yesterday. Some 50 delegates attended.

The new class permits a total of six entries from one farm, as compared with two previously.

Officers re-elected were: W. R. Truman, Aulac, N. B., to his third term as president; James F. O'Brien, Windsor, N. S., vice-president; J. H. King, Moncton, sixth term as secretary-manager. John Carter of Aulac and Wylie Mitchell, Amherst, were re-elected directors of the Association, with A. Roberts appointed director for Prince Edward Island, succeeding Fulton Sanderson.

Other directors were appointed by the Agriculture Departments: H. K. McCharles, Moncton, Federal; J. C. Bennett, New Brunswick; A. B. Banks, Nova Scotia; and S. C. Wright, P. E. I.

The interim financial report showed total receipts of \$2,808 and expenses of \$2,672.

Sees Canada In New Naval Training Role

OTTAWA, May 1 — (CP) — The possibility of a Canadian naval training program similar to the Commonwealth Air Training Plan of the Second World War was foreseen today by Britain's Third Sea Lord, Vice-Admiral Sir Michael M. Denny.

Vice-Admiral Denny, in charge of construction, equipment and repair and armament of Royal Navy ships, said Britain now is training Canadian naval aviation observers. But rather than an increase in this sphere, he believed Britain would rather see more Royal Navy trainees — particularly officers — schooled in Canadian establishments.

Canada's sons, now fighting in Korea, will no doubt see the spirit-posts worshipped in many villages. In the smaller villages bamboos are used, but in the town and selected jungle-places, the spirit-posts are quite large. The red Karens are great spirit worshippers.

On the mysterious and uninhabited Pacific island of Galapagos may be seen huge herds of Marine lizards. The strange creatures reach a length of four feet. Their chief food is seaweed. At night they hide in the earth. In the daytime they come forth and wait for low tide when they make their way to the edge of the water in order to feed. I Cor. XI, 24-26. "The Countess of Dufferin", C. P. R. No 1 locomotive may be seen in the Depot in Winnipeg. It was the first locomotive to arrive in Winnipeg. The old engine was brought up on a barge, towed by the steamer Selkirk on the Red River and every person who could walk or ride made the trip to Number 6 warehouse at the foot of the post office to see the first engine — the engine that was to be the forerunner of many others did not come to Manitoba's capital on rails. Though steam was up in order that the whistle might blend with the shouts of the crowd who had gathered for the occasion, the wheels of the Countess Dufferin rested securely on the barge. While the white people went wild with excitement — the Indians just stood and stared, completely awed by the iron horse.
