BARNUM'S elephant "Pilot," the next in order to "Jumbo," was shot at New York, on the 5th. His killing became necessary for the safety of the public... JORDAN, MARSH & CO., of Boston, for thirty years one of the largest dry goods concerns in the United States, will retire from the wholesale business on the 15th inst... Five Cases Hats, two Cases Tweeds, opened to-day at D. A. BRUCE'S... Mr. Donn would call special attention to the sale of Furniture, to take place to-morrow, (Thursday), at eleven o'clock, at the residence of Rev. F. Smallwood, Kent Street... Rev. INGHAM SUTCLIFFE, one of the oldest and best known ministers of the Methodist Church, died at his residence Yarmouth, N. S., on the 6th inst., after a brief illness, caused by paralysis... Over 3,000 notes due in the leading bank at Montreal on the 4th, all were retired except eighteen. The Times says this will be bad news for the Brit papers, which have been building up their hopes on a commercial crash... Those who wish to see a really interesting subject treated of in a masterly manner, will have an opportunity of doing so to-morrow evening, in Y. M. C. A. Hall. We refer to Prof. Burwash's lecture... T. H. HOBSON, wholesale cheese and butter merchant, of Montreal, lately arrested at the instance of the Bank of Montreal for obtaining advances, has compromised with the Bank for \$50,000, and fled to the United States to escape his other creditors... Owing to the depredations committed by the burglars in Toronto, business men are becoming thoroughly alarmed. In one business house in the west end of the city the following notice is posted up over the safe door:—"Please do not blow up the safe; the door is unlocked."... The steam tug "Henry Aitken," owned by Ben Bros., having been thoroughly repaired, was launched from the slip alongside Peake's No. 3 wharf to-day. In addition to the usual repairs she has this year received a new keel and bottom. She is now in splendid order and ready for a good summer's work... It is reported that Mr. W. C. Munderloh, the German Consul in Montreal, has completed arrangements with the Government for the running of the lines of steamers between Montreal and Antwerp. The estimates contain a figure of \$24,000 as a subsidy. The line is to be known as the White Cross Line, and will run a steamer monthly from Montreal in summer and Halifax or St. John in winter... S. L. ROBERTS, formerly a prominent citizen of Stratford, but who through drunkenness had lost the confidence of his friends, died in an empty house in that city on the 7th inst. He was a well educated man and editor of the first paper at Stratford. He was also formerly Reeve of the town. He had a family but they separated some time ago and his wife is dead. His only child still lives. His age is about 50 years... ANXIETY to find something with which to credit Mr. Davies as compensation for the wrong he did the Province in lowering the rate of the people, the Patriot seizes upon the fact of the passage through the Committee of the Rustico Bank Bill, and says the money was due to Mr. Davies' efforts. No doubt, Mr. Davies did his best; but we have not to learn that he did more than Mr. Broken or any other representative of the Island; and that his influence is greater with the majority, is most unlikely... A HEAVY FINE.—The captain of the steamer "Haupt," plying between Boston and Annapolis, N. S., was fined \$1,000 recently for not furnishing a complete list of the passengers to the United States custom house officer. From this decision he appealed to the Secretary of the Treasury at Washington. The cause of the clerk for not furnishing the proper list is that he was unable to obtain it, as many of the passengers were drunk, and upon being asked their names, they refused to furnish them. It is thought the fine will be remitted, as there was evidently no intention of violating the law.—Boston Post... PARTICULARS of the railway collision on the Canadian Pacific Railway, at Riverview, on the 6th, have been received. The express train from St. Paul, in charge of Conductor Eisten and Engineer Robinson, was coming into the station with supposed right of way, but the freight train going south did not get into the siding in time. The freight train broke in two, causing a delay of ten minutes. The fireman of the express jumped just in time to save his life; but Robinson, the driver of the express, stood at his post and died. The only other person hurt was George Blackwell, of Bradford, Ontario, who was travelling on the Pullman car, and injudiciously jumped on a heap of stones. It is reported Conductor Miller and driver Hard have fled, fearing arrest for manslaughter... At the Tewkesbury Alms House investigation, held in Boston on the 4th inst., the Chairman asked to have the issue, whether bodies had been delivered to medical schools, admitted, as that would not be disputed. Governor Butler replied that he expected to give that bodies had been delivered elsewhere—some to be skinned, and the skins saved. He proposed to show that after the bodies were buried they had been taken up and sent away. He would go into the graveyard at Tewkesbury, and produce some of the alleged remains. The investigation was to go on to prove that the testimony given was absolutely false. The books sent to him as the records of the Alms House were not complete. They were copies of the original. After further testimony showing that bodies had been sent away for unlawful purposes, the investigation was adjourned.

Tigish Election—The Nominations
SUMMERSIDE, April 11.
The nomination of candidates for Tigish District took place to-day.
Peter Gavin, Esq., the Government candidate, was proposed by Lawrence Doyle, and seconded by Messrs. Patrick Christopher, J. Gallant and Edward O'Connor.
John A. Matheson, Esq., opposition candidate, proposed by John Christopher and seconded by Messrs. L. Bernard, Jas. Webb, W. S. Larkin, Paul Martin and four others.
DOMINION PARLIAMENT.
Military.
OTTAWA, April 11.
Hon. Mr. Caron, Minister of Militia, yesterday introduced a bill, for the consolidation of the militia laws, and providing for the formation of troops of Cavalry at Quebec and Kingston. It also provides for the establishing of three schools of Infantry, the appointment of a quarter master general, and the raising of a permanent force of seven hundred and fifty men.
The bill was discussed at length. Many of the members favored a larger expenditure on the rank and file.
King's County Election Case.
The Committee on the King's County Election Case was in session yesterday. Mr. Dalton McCarthy moved that it was the opinion of the Committee that Dr. Robertson was disqualified as a Candidate for the election in King's County.
Mr. L. H. Davies moved in amendment that it was the opinion of the Committee that Dr. Robertson was not a member of the Legislature at the time he ran the Dominion Election.
The amendment was lost and Mr. McCarthy's motion was carried 7 to 14.
Mr. Weldon moved that it was the opinion of the Committee that Returning Officer McCormack should have returned Dr. McIntyre and Dr. Robertson as members of the Dominion Parliament.
Mr. McCarthy moved that it was the opinion of the Committee that the votes cast for Dr. Robertson were lost, and that Mr. McDonald was legally elected and that the return be amended to that effect.
The Committee after discussing the last two motions adjourned until to-morrow without a taking vote on either.
Telegraph Notes.
Mr. Parnell is confined to his house by illness.
Twenty-four arrests have been made on the outskirts of Cork and Limerick.
Williston, Knight & Co., butter dealers, New York, have assigned. Junior member of firm embezzled \$100,000.
It is now known that Bernard Gallagher, the arrested dynamite fiend, has within the last few years made frequent trips between the United States and Great Britain.
Deasy, drowned at Cork on Sunday evening and supposed to have suffered death from his political tenets, was according to late reports merely killed in a drunken quarrel.
Sir Wm. Harcourt's bill passed the Commons and was immediately sent to the Lords where it was adopted, without delay. The royal assent will be received by telegraph to-day, and the Act will become a law.
In the Lords on the 9th in the case of Clarke vs. Bradlaugh, Lord High Chancellor Selborne declared that Clarke, as a common informer, was unable to sue Bradlaugh for sitting and voting in the Commons without taking oath of allegiance. Judgment against Bradlaugh was therefore reversed with costs.
The bill to amend the law in regard to explosives was introduced in the Commons on the 9th by Sir Wm. Harcourt and read a first time. It was then taken up in committee of the whole, and passed through committee without being altered. Progress was then reported amid cheers, and the bill passed its third reading. The government were much surprised at the prompt action taken on the bill as they expected that it would be considered longer in committee.
Sir Wm. Harcourt in introducing the bill said the nature of the danger which it sought to guard against was well known. We have to deal, he continued, with an organized plan against all interests of society, and with men who announce plans for wholesale murder. The speech of the Home Secretary was heartily cheered, especially by the Conservative members. Sir Richard Assheton Cross said the Opposition were quite willing to assent to the bill in order that all British subjects at home and abroad would know that the law was no longer to be defied with impunity. Sir Wm. Harcourt further explained that the measure would be a permanent one. He was convinced the danger was very imminent.
