It received publicity in the United States. Here is the latest from Women's Wear Daily.

"San Francisco, Aug. 10—A report that more than 100,000 Norwegian silver fox furs were indirectly exchanged for \$800,000 worth of dried California prunes was confirmed here today by Jack Gomperts, president of Jack Gomperts and Co., dried fruit exporters and distributors.

"The Dutch company then bought the prunes with dollars and shipped them to Norway for distribution there by the Norwegian Wholesale Grocers Association.

ISLAND POTATO VARIETIES OF the twenty-one varieties of potatoes grown at the Experimental Station in 1910, only one, Irish Cobbler, is grown today.

One of the few varieties that have been developed and named on Prince Edward Island, is the McIntyre, which was also grown at the Station in 1910.

While McIntyres never headed the list of potatoes, in yield, at the Charlottetown Station, they were fifth several times, and seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth in a list of thirty-three varieties.

We hear that selection work with McIntyres is going on along the same line, and that they have been registered as a commercial variety.

N.Y., New Jersey and the southeastern United States.

For many years after Cobblers and Mountains dominated the potato seed trade of the Island, McIntyres were grown in the neighbourhood of Victoria, P.E.I., and shipped by schooner to special trade centres on Cape Breton Island, to Pictou and the adjoining north shore towns and villages where they were appreciated.

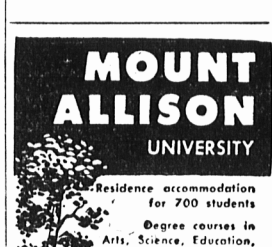

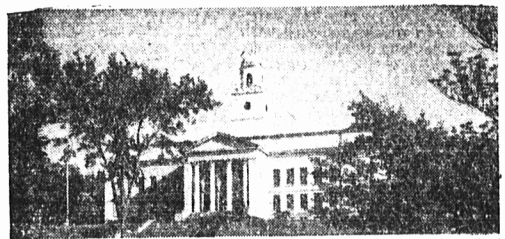

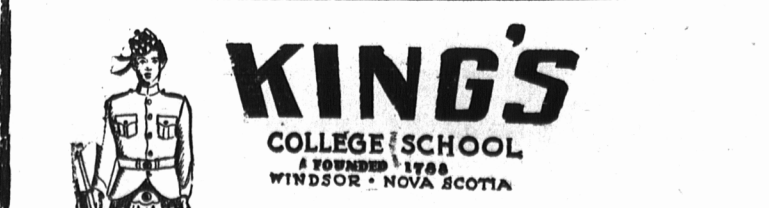
