INCREASING TAXATION.

The customs and inland revenue taxes, together, amounted last year to \$34,586,389, as against \$27,759,285 in 1895-96, \$28,648,626 in 1896-67, and \$29,676,455 in 1897-98. But although taxation has since 1896 increased to the extent of \$6,607,000 a year, or nearly \$1.25 per head our Liberal Government continues to run the country into debt.

REDUCED RAILWAY RATES.

Our representatives at Ottawa, Messrs. McDonald and Martin, have called attention to the justice and expediency of reducing the rates of passage on the P. E. Island railway. They have given the Minister of Railways good reasons for this new departure. These reasons seem to have touched the ministerial conscience. We trust that Mr. Blair, will weigh them carefully and take action in the direction indicated. A reduction of railway rates would be a real boon to our people; and we have little doubt that though some money may be lost to the railway in the beginning more money will be gained by it in the end.

LIBERAL METHODS.

ANOTHER illustration of Liberal methods has been given to the public in Ontario. In the protest against the return of Mr. Garrow for West Huron, corruption has been proved; but one witness—a campaigner named Linklater—is required to testify on the question of agency. The court has sat several times to hear Linklater's testimony; but Linklater cannot be found. He is out of the country, in hiding, and beyond the reach of a subpoena. It is understood, says the Mail and Empire, that Linklater is paid to stay away. The machine worked to elect Mr. Garrow, and its efforts seem to have been necessary to override public opinion, although Mr. Garrow had been created a Minister without portfolio that he might have prestige in the contest. Now a necessary witness is withheld that Mr. Garrow—a Minister of the Crown—may hold his seat.

THE SPOILS SYSTEM IN OPERATION

Mr. H. A. BATE, of Ottawa was an active Liberal partisan previous to the general election of 1896. It was he who hung over the platform of the Liberal Convention a motto with the device "Laurier expects every man to do his duty." He has been rewarded in this way: Last year the Government sold the major proportion of the penitentiary-made binder twine to H. A. Bate and Co.—\$38,695, worth. It is stated that the purchase price was 4 1/2 cents per pound, and that the twine was sold at prices ranging from 10c to 15c per pound. If this be so, the firm more than doubled its money. The Mail and Empire states that the same firm received the contract (without tender) for the supplies for the Yukon military force,—the amount being \$37,744. All the goods were bought at Ottawa from Mr. Bate, although they could have been got cheaper in Vancouver! Such is the spoils system in operation. Partisan politicians make money at the expense of the taxpayers.

MISSING MAIL BAG

The loss of a registered letter, as announced by THE EXAMINER yesterday, is an unusual occurrence. The letter referred to was mailed in Charlottetown on the 26th June by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh, of the Portland Packing Company here, to their agent, Mr. C. W. Tidmarsh, at Grand Entry, Magdalen Islands, and contained \$1,000 in \$20 bank notes. This letter, with the mail bag containing it and other valuables, besides the usual amount of mail matter, is still missing. It has been traced to Souris. The postmaster at Souris states that on the 26th he made up five bags of mail as usual, one for each of the five Magdalen Islands; and as usual sent them on board the steamer. It appears that only four of the five bags reached their destination. The post office officials involved are experienced and careful men of good character. It is hoped that the missing bag has been mislaid.

CONSTITUTIONAL QUESTIONS.

The Colonist of Victoria, answers several questions that have been propounded in view of the pending ministerial crisis. Here are some of them:

"Must Mr. Martin resign the Attorney-Generalship because Mr. Semlin has asked him to? The answer is that he need not. He can legally hold office until dismissed by the Lieutenant-Governor. He is just as much attorney general now as he has been at any time since his appointment."

"Must the Lieutenant-Governor dismiss Mr. Martin if asked to do so by Mr. Semlin or a majority of the cabinet? Not necessarily. He may refuse to accept the advice of his ministers in this particular, which would of course leave them no alternative except to resign."

"Can the Lieutenant-Governor decline to accept any one recommended as a member of his cabinet by the Premier? He can, and it rests with the Premier whether or not such a refusal shall be regarded as an expression of want of confidence."

"Has the Lieutenant-Governor any right to consult his personal predilections in regard to members of the cabinet? He undoubtedly has. A minister must possess the confidence both of the Lieutenant-Governor and the legislature."

"Does the resignation of a premier carry with it the resignation of the whole ministry? It unquestionably does in Great Britain, and most of the colonies, but there may be some doubt if under the peculiar phraseology of our constitution act this is strictly true of British Columbia. In point of fact it would be true of this province, because if the Lieutenant-Governor accepted the resignation of the Premier as such it would be both tendered and accepted on behalf of the whole government."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—Over 500,000,000 persons in this world have now, not only no voice in making their own laws, for this is true of the millions of Russia and China also, but are governed by laws made in countries that they have never seen and for the most part by people who have never seen the countries and people for which they legislate.

—Henry Norman declares that the key to the Transvaal situation is not the question of a few years, more or less, in the length of the franchise granted to the Uitlanders in the Transvaal, but of the whole future of British rule in South Africa. Students of the situation, from a military point of view, should keep their eyes upon Laing's Neck. This is the strategic point at which the railway runs in the tunnel between the Orange Free State and the Transvaal. The last place on British authority beyond the tunnel is Charlottetown, and the principal advance into the Transvaal will be made from here; therefore, the Boers will be given no opportunity to seize or blow up this strategic tunnel. Only one outcome is possible. What ever news you receive to the contrary you may confidently rely upon the above information.

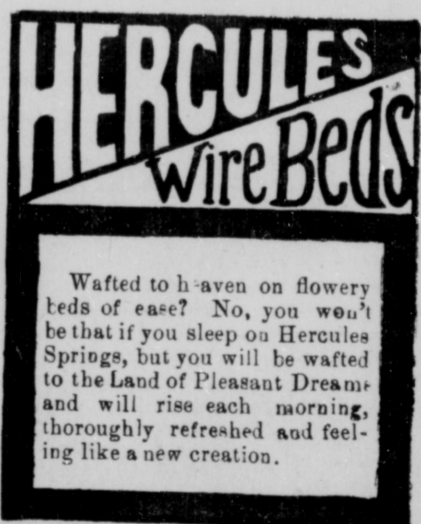
