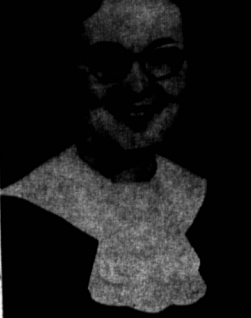

Meeting Of Association For Retarded Children

The regular monthly meeting
 of the Prince Edward Island As-
 sociation for Retarded Children
 was held in West Kent School on
 Monday evening May 13. Mr. St.
 John president was in the chair.
 The news letter from Winnipeg
 which read in part: "May 4, 1957,
 was a historic occasion in Winni-
 peg, for retarded children — and
 for all of us. On that day Kin-
 smen School for Retarded Children
 was turned over to the Associa-
 tion for Retarded Children in
 Greater Winnipeg by Kinmen
 Club Winnipeg." This was in-
 deed encouraging because in 1953
 Winnipeg had only one Special
 Day Training Class comparable
 to the one now functioning here in
 Charlottetown in West Kent School.
 Correspondence from the Can-
 adian Association for Retarded
 Children was read and discussed.
 Mr. Eugene Kelly was appointed
 chairman of the Nominating
 Committee with Mrs. Trevor Wye
 Mrs. Ernest Lord, Mr. Wendel
 Cudmore also acting on this com-
 mittee.
 Considerable discussion took
 place regarding arrangements for
 the tag day to be held June 18th.
 Mrs. Charles Smith was appointed
 to be chairman of the program-
 me committee.
 Mrs. Johnston advised the meet-
 ing that she had addressed sev-
 eral service clubs and church or-
 ganizations and all had indicated
 great interest in the welfare
 of the Mentally retarded; Mrs.
 Johnston stated that the first ap-
 proach to the question of Men-
 tal Retardation should be a posi-
 tive one focusing attention on po-
 tentialities instead of imperfec-

On Monday, May 6th, the pa-
 tients of the Provincial Sana-
 torium met in their beautiful
 auditorium to pay a
 farewell tribute to the Dietician,
 Miss Hazel Stearns, on the eve
 of her departure.
 The auditorium was decorated
 with Spring flowers and Miss
 Stearns was accompanied to the
 auditorium by Miss Lumina Pol-
 ler, Superintendent of Nurses. Two
 patients met her at the en-
 trance and escorted her to the
 front of the hall. An address was
 read by Sister St. Hugh and Miss
 Lettie Vincent presented Miss
 Stearns with a beautiful gift. Miss
 Marion Bell represented the Or-
 thopedic Centre.

ADDRESS
 Dear Miss Stearns: —
 We, the patients of the Provin-
 cial Sanatorium and Orthopedic
 Centre cannot let you go from us
 without making some public rec-
 ognition of our gratitude to you.
 There is no need here for a his-
 tory of the growth of this Blessed
 Institution. Its service to the Tub-
 erculosis patients of this Province
 cannot be assessed. Your part in
 its development and maintain-
 ence is well known throughout the
 length and breadth of Prince Ed-
 ward Island. Together with the re-
 cently deceased dear Dr. Creel-
 man your fostered and cultivated
 the marvellous spirit for which this
 institute is widely known. Although
 your principal field was dietetics,
 you never-the-less had an eye and
 heart for the whole Hospital and
 every patient here was always
 your first consideration.
 We are well aware that the role
 of Dietician in any institution for
 the sick is not an enviable one.
 Sick people are hard to please and
 very often complain, not because
 things are wrong but because they
 are sick. Therefore, a Dietician
 must be an artist in the prepara-
 tion and serving of food. We know
 that "not bread alone" does
 man live, yet, sick people become
 very interested in the food serv-
 ed, perhaps not so much from the
 point of view of the food alone
 but because of the very monotony
 and routine of eating from a tray.
 Mealtime in a home is one of the
 happiest moments of the day,
 when the family unites, and hearts
 and spirits are filled with gladness
 in the exchange of individual in-
 terests. Patients miss this family
 gathering in an institution such
 as this, when for days, weeks,
 months, yes and in some cases
 years, they are confined to their
 tray set before them.
 The food, its high standard and
 presentation will be present at the June
 meeting.
