

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Sept. 12.

The Y. M. C. A. service this evening was presided over by Mr. John Burgoyne, formerly proprietor of the Reporter. Mr. Gauld of St. John, Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., who has come over to represent the New Brunswick Association at the funeral to-morrow, referred in a most touching manner to Mr. Morrow's death. The service last Monday was presided over by Mr. Morrow, who read and expounded the 16th Psalm. The same Psalm was read to-day. Mr. Gauld said that the news of Mr. Morrow's death was like a paralytic thrill to his many friends in St. John, and the gloom in that city was as deep as that which spread over Halifax. He referred to Mr. Morrow's great interest in young men and the work of the Association. He drew a vivid picture of Mr. Morrow when he saw him last in the bloom of life at Charlottetown, as the delegates to the Convention separated, and as the boats steamed away from the wharf he sang "Shall we gather at the river," and as he saw him this evening in the calm embrace of death.

DORCHESTER, Sept. 11.

Nelson, a five year term, tried to escape from the penitentiary this morning by breaking for the woods while out emptying slops. Five shots were fired after him, one taking effect in the shoulder. He was recaptured after reaching the woods.

TORONTO, Sept. 11.

The Globe, this morning has the following special cable, dated London, Sept. 10th:—The Times, speaking of the Pacific Railway bargain, says the definite settlement must await the assembling of the Dominion Parliament. It includes at length the route taken by the railroad and expresses the hope that the disbursement of the money expended on the construction of the Pacific Railroad during the next ten years, will improve the position of all railway land and industrial undertakings throughout Canada. Sir A. T. Galt, Hon. J. H. Pope and Sir John Macdonald sail on the 16th inst. I understand they expect to take the signed agreement complete with them. I believe the minor makers of detail are referred to New York. Sir Charles Tupper remains until the 23rd inst. in Ireland, where his daughter lies dangerously ill.

## AFGHANISTAN.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that Major McGregor's brigade marched from Candahar on the 8th inst. to ease the pressure there with regard to supplies. General Roberts accompanies Major McGregor, and will meet Gen. Sandeman at Kala-Abdull to discuss questions relative to transport of supplies between Sibi and Candahar.

## EUROPEAN.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.

A cable despatch says that the Emperor of Russia returns to Livadia with Princess Dolgerack. She will consent only to a regular marriage. This avowal causes a sensation at St. Petersburg.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 12.

The Sultan has issued an imperial hatt, dismissing Kadir Pasha, Prime Minister, and appointing said Pasha, his successor. The hatt states that in view of gravity of present state of affairs and urgency of measures to be taken, a change in ministry is necessary and expresses the conviction that said Pasha will be able to effect satisfactory solution of pending questions. The Cabinet has been reconstructed as follows: Server Pasha, President of Council of State, in place of Aarifi Pasha; Assini Pasha, Minister of Foreign Affairs, in place of Abbedin Pasha; Nazif Pasha, Minister Pious foundations; Raif Pasha, Minister of Commerce, in place of Kadir Pasha, who held this ministry in conjunction with the Premiership; Kiamel Pasha, Minister of Public Instruction, in place of Munif Effendi. Other ministers retain their present positions.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

A train from Waterloo station, London, for Hampton Court, came in conclusion with an engine last night. Four persons were killed and thirty injured.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

Mr. Gladstone has published an expression of his hearty gratitude to all at home and abroad who manifested their sympathy for him on his recent illness.

The Porte's reply on the Greek frontier will be presented on Saturday. It declares that it is impossible to accept the proposals of the Powers and begs them in the name of justice to allow the negotiations to be reopened.

A Greek iron clad and two frigates have been ordered to cruise on the Albanian coast.

MADRID, Sept. 12.

The Queen has been safely delivered of a daughter. Baptism has been fixed for

Sept. 14th. Ex-Queen Isabella will be one of the sponsors.

MADRID, Sept. 12.

The Princess was born at about nine o'clock Saturday night. According to ancient etiquette the ministers, marshals, grandees and diplomats awaited the event in the ante chamber. Duke of Sixto, Grand Master of the Palace, announced the birth, and shortly after the King brought out the infant and showed it to the assemblage. The Minister of Justice drew up a deed attesting the birth. The infant will be christened Mercedes and about a dozen other names. The birth was announced to the people by salvos of artillery.

ROME, Sept. 11.

A stream of lava is running from Vesuvius, near the new railway, to the crater. Some imprudent visitors have been injured.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

Thirty corpses had been recovered from the Seaham pit up to 7 o'clock on Friday evening, when the search suspended for the night in consequence of an accumulation of gas.

MADRID, Sept. 11.

Measures will be taken in the Basque provinces to enforce the loyalty of the clergy and strengthen the authorities. The recent elections have filled the Basque Councils-Generals with Carlists and Democrats. Hardly any Government candidates were successful.

VIENNA, Sept. 11.

The idea that the interview between Bismarck and Von Haymerle has been to provide against eventualities in the East and possible separate action of England and Russia, may be entirely dismissed.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

The Government Inspector has announced that the number of dead at Seaham is about 165.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 11.

Riza Pasha telegraphed on Friday that the Albanians had determined to resist. The Cabinet immediately met and it is reported the Sultan was much incensed with the Albanians, and determined to employ force.

A Pera despatch says the condition of Asia Minor is lamentable. It contains 200,000 lawless refugees without means of subsistence except pillage.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

A despatch from Simla says: Intelligence has been received here that a serious insurrection has broken out in Herat, and that the Governor accompanied by his principal officers and several hundred horsemen has passed Zamindwar, on his way to Herat. Major McGregor, with a brigade of British troops, has marched for Kala Abdulla via the Pishin Pass.

A telegram from Ragusa was received in Paris this evening, stating that 6,000 Montenegrins with eight cannon are on their way to Dulcigno, and are resolved to fight if resisted.

## UNITED STATES.

DENISON, Texas, Sept. 11.

At Atlanta, I. T., on Friday, an Indian was executed for the murder of Mrs. Washington, a year ago. A spot was made on the prisoner's bare breast, and the prisoner's cousin, who was chosen executioner, fired the ball true to the mark. Dixon's head fell forward on his breast and he expired without a struggle.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11.

The President and party visited the Mechanic's Pavilion last night, when fifteen thousand people were present. The President and General Sherman were warmly greeted, but they did not address the audience, on account of fatigue.

VINEYARD HAVEN, Sept. 11.

The schr. Southern Cross, of Parrsboro, N. S., Patterson, from New Haven for Shulee, N. S., in ballast, dragged her anchor in this harbor yesterday in a heavy gale. To prevent fouling another vessel slipped her chains and ran ashore on the west side of the harbor. She lies high on the beach.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sep. 12.

A committee of settlers from Fresno County and Musselboro Region, Tulare County, waited upon President Hayes yesterday. They stated that the object of their visit was to present him with an address, setting forth the true history of the recent strife between them and Southern Pacific Railway Co. They ask his careful consideration of the document and asked him to visit Hanford so that he might see people who transformed desert lands in that section with productive farms and convince himself that they were not outlaws. They stated that they considered evictions unjust and cruel, as a question as to who were properly entitled to possession of lands was now pending before United States court. The President received the address and he replied he would do all he could consistently for the cause of the settlers.
