MONTREAL, Aug. 13 (CP)—Four former residents of Prince Edward Island, Rev. St. Clair A. Monaghan, Rev. John Sullivan, Rev. Hugh MacPhee and Rev. Vincent Murphy, were ordained to the priesthood by Rev. Bishop Emmanuel Deschamps in spacious Gesù Church here today with 16 other members of the Society of Jesus.

RENO, Nev., Aug. 13 (AP)—Nineteen persons were killed and nearly 60, including two Canadians, were injured in the wreck of a speeding Southern Pacific streamlined railway train, derailed Saturday night as it sped over a small bridge 20 miles west of Carlin, Nev. No Canadians were among the identified dead.

Request For Re-entry Of Nazi Agent Refused. PARIS, Aug. 13 (AP)—The German Ambassador, Count Von Weizsaeck, left precipitately for Berlin tonight after the French Government rejected his request that the Nazi agent, Otto Abetz, be permitted to re-enter France. The ambassador went almost directly from a personal interview with Premier Daladier to a train for Berlin.

FREderICTON, N.B., Aug. 13 (CP)—A tire blowout caused an automobile to hurtle out of control for 150 feet near Blackville today, turn over three times and claim the life of the driver, Harry Russell, 52, Fredericton garage mechanic. In hospital at Newcastle, seriously injured but expected to recover, were Mrs. L. E. Wolfe, of Fredericton, and Thomas J. Whitty, 34, who suffered back injuries but was able to be taken to his home here, William Wolfe, 12, and Betty Wolfe, 14, were shaken up and bruised.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 13 (AP)—Fifteen persons were killed and more than 100 seriously injured today when a local train was derailed near Patroala, 60 miles here. A switchman's error was blamed for the accident. Many of the injured were expected to die. It was the fourth serious railway wreck in Rumania in eight months.

LIVERPOOL, N. S., Aug. 13 (CP)—Philip Yarn, 42, was killed instantly near here today when a truck struck an automobile he was helping to repair and crashed him between the auto and a rock.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 13—Henry McCuller, 17-year-old youth from Saint John, was sentenced Saturday to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary for breaking jail here. He sawed through a bar of his cell door but was captured in the jail cellar.
