## Beef Show, Sale Sated Today, Fri.

The 110 steers entered in the P.E.I. Easter beef show and sale arrived at the Exhibition grounds yesterday for the annual competition.

The animals will be judged today by C.A. Staples, head buyer for Canada Packers Ltd., Montreal and will be sold Friday afternoon by auctioneer Claude Cresswell.

The annual banquet will be held Thursday evening at the YMCA, following the show.

The animals run from a low of 600 pounds to a high of 1,100 and they will be weighed on the scales at the Canada Packers plant here.

Gloria Ford, Milton, took the top Hereford and Grand Championship awards last year, and is back again this year.

The show will be opened officially by Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae.

Breeders' associations are presenting special awards to develop special interest in animals of their respective breeds. The Canadian Hereford Breeders took this effort with \$150 to the grand champion steer if he is sired by a registered Hereford Bull and \$100 to the reserve champion with the same requirements.

The Maritime Aberdeen Angus Association is offering \$75 to the grand champion, if he is an Angus and sired by a registered bull, and the Canadian Short-horn Breeders Association is offering \$50 for the grand champion, if he is sired by a registered Short-horn bull.

Other special prizes are offered by provincial breed associations.

Highway officials were working on the problem yesterday.

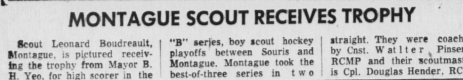

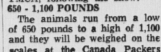
