

# Rotary Members Report On District Conference

Several of the twelve Rotary Club members and their wives who attended the District Assembly and Conference held at Sydney last week, gave their impressions at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday, presided over by immediate past president G. C. Fisher.

Gordon Avar described the work of the retiring District Governor Ben Guss of Saint John, N.B., and touched on the qualifications of the incoming District Governor Art Johnston of St. John's, Nfld.

Ruel LePage regretted the absence of more younger Rotarians from all parts of the District, pointing out the need of a broader view through Conference contacts. A recreational Centre has been started by the Sydney Club on a 2-acre area there donated by Hon. Charles Burchell, well-known Halifax Rotarian.

T. Roy Cudmore made enthusiastic reference to a proposal brought before the club, which if developed will mean great publicity to Charlottetown and the province generally. The suggestion, although not specifically dealt with for the co-operation of the state Governor in each of the United States, along with the Premier of each of the Canadian Provinces to pick a senior high school student to undergo a week or ten days studying Saint John, N.B., on the "Canadian Way of Life," was concluding the study, the entire party, along with provincial Pre-

miers and other distinguished citizens as well as American authorities, come to Charlottetown with a view to taking part in the dedication of the Provincial Building as a "National Shrine," the Cradle of Confederation. It was agreed that much cooperation and enthusiastic acceptance by those in authority would be required to bring about the event.

Geo. C. Fisher, fortieth president of the club Charlottetown who also attended the Sydney Conference, made a run-down of the activities of the club during the past year and thanked the officers, directors and committee chairmen for their unstinting support.

A resolution moved by Roy Cudmore and seconded by Dr. W. J. MacMillan, heartily thanked Dr. Fisher for his splendid leadership.

On the International level, speakers at the conference included Kenneth G. Partridge, of Port Credit, Ont., representing the Port Credit Rotary International, Ernest L. Erickson, Rutland Vermont, Rotary Information Counsellor, Benjamin R. Guss, Q.C., St. John, N.B., District Governor, and the general meetings.

Don Guss received a hearty welcome on his return from Europe where he attended Rotary International. Guests of Rotary were Newman McLellan, Jacksonville, Florida and Fred Fraser of Hamilton, Ont.

## Arthritis May Be Mentally Caused - Parent Domination

TORONTO (CP)—A theory that crippling rheumatoid arthritis may be linked to psychological disturbances was advanced today by two American doctors.

Dr. Sanford Gifford and Dr. Theodore B. Bayles, both of Boston, Mass., reported the results of a psychological study of 95 arthritic patients to the ninth International Congress on Rheumatic Diseases, which opened here Sunday night.

"The similarities between rheumatoid arthritis and other psychosomatic (mentally caused) disorders are more important than any differences that can be demonstrated," they said.

Rheumatoid arthritis is the most widespread and crippling of the more than 100 rheumatic diseases to be considered by the 1,000 delegates to the week-long congress.

Dr. Gifford and Dr. Bayles found a pattern of parent domination, usually by the mother, among their patients.

"Patients with arthritis emphasize their mother's harsh and controlling," they reported. "Often the mother has difficulty in permitting the child to leave home or to marry."

Many patients felt guilty and believed that arthritis was self-inflicted punishment for past errors. Others were attempting to compensate for the loss of a loved one.

The paper was one of 225 which are to be presented. The congress meets every four years as a function of La Ligue Internationale Contre le Rheumatisme, the international professional society in the field.

**TO STUDY CORTISONE**

Two long-accepted forms of arthritis were re-classified as separate diseases of their own by Dr. Currier McEwen of New York.

Dr. McEwen found that spondylitis, which causes the vertebrae of the spine to fuse into a solid rod, is not a form of arthritis which causes separate bone joints in other parts of the body to fuse. On the same basis, Dr. McEwen concluded that arthritis associated with the skin disease psoriasis, long believed to be simply those two diseases occurring together, was actually a third disease, not directly linked to either.

One of the featured aspects of the congress is to be a critical evaluation of cortisone, hailed as a wonder drug for the treatment of arthritis at its introduction eight years ago, but since found to have serious side-effects.

One of these side effects was described by Dr. Richard Freyburg of New York, who found that 30 per cent of a group of patients receiving cortisone or cortisone-like drugs developed ulcers.

## Some 1,447 Students Are Writing Exams

Provincial examination for grades ten, eleven and twelve began yesterday morning with students writing at ten centres throughout the province.

846 students are scheduled to write grade ten, 378 grade eleven and 223 grade twelve, showing a considerable increase over last year in grade eleven and twelve.

This year pupils in Charlottetown and Summerside who have been awarded a School Board certificate will not be obliged to write the grade ten examinations unless they wish to try for a scholarship, thereby reducing the number writing grade ten. Last year 996 wrote grade ten, including Charlottetown and Summerside, 309 grade eleven and 199 grade twelve. To the figures given above may be added the many who will be writing supplementary examinations in various subjects.

The following is an approximate breakdown of the numbers writing in the various centres with the figures in order of grade ten, grade eleven and grade twelve: Tignish long dash—40, 30, 17; O'Leary—56, 42, 8; Summerside—175, 75, 55; Kensington—59, 30, 17; Kinkora—32, 19, 16; North Rustico—25, 19, 12; Souris—53, 28, 25; Morell—31, 15, 17; Montague—101, 50, 18; Charlottetown 268, 69, 40.

**Potato Fields Are Excellent**

So far as diseases are concerned, the potato fields appear to be in excellent condition at this time, and no reports of blackleg or of seed piece decay have been received at bulletin headquarters, states Weekly Potato Bulletin.

Potato flea beetles are present in many fields and this brood will continue until about July 15. If they become numerous and cause severe damage to the foliage, you can control them by spraying with DDT 50 per cent wettable powder, 2 pounds to 100 gallons of water. When the plants are small only one nozzle per row is all that is necessary.

During the past week webworms have been attacking many different kinds of plants including flowers, vegetables, potatoes and clover. They fasten the leaves together with fine threads and feed inside. DDT at the same rate as for flea beetles will control them. In small gardens use 3 teaspoons to a gallon of water. Cucumbers, pumpkins and squash should not be sprayed with DDT, as it may cause burning to the foliage.
