 The delegation will be made up of members of the tolls committee set up by the two countries to work out methods of collecting tolls when the St. Lawrence seaway opens in 1959.

 A timely display for this season of the year is that the Post Office Department which appears in the window of Maritime Electric Co. Attention is directed to dead line dates for mailing; proper addressing of mail and the proper postage to be used.

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Splendid Attendance At City Blood Donor Clinic

A total of 405 donors registered at the first of the two days of Red Cross blood donor clinics being held at The Clover Club in the Canadian Legion Building at Charlottetown yesterday and today. It was interesting to note that 82 of these donors - 20.24 per cent - attended for the first time while 108 of them came from 35 districts outside of Charlottetown. Forty-seven students from St. Dunstan's University attended the morning clinic in a body and were transported to and from the College through the courtesy of the Island Motor Transport Company which provided the bus and driver. Another 90 St. Dunstan's students have signed pledge cards as donors and will attend tomorrow's clinic. This 90 will be about as many donors as can be handled during the morning clinic hour, so others should attend in the afternoon or evening. - between the hours of 2 and 4 (not 2 to 5 as cards sent out) and between 7 and 9 in the evening. It is essential that there at least be 500 donors in attendance at today's clinics so that Charlottetown may come within its 1,000 objective. Workers and refreshments for yesterday's clinics were provided by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Charlottetown Branch, Canadian Legion, with other tasks being carried out by different Charlottetown nurses, members of the Red Cross Corps headed by Mrs. Benj. Rogers and representatives of the High School Red Cross at Notre Dame Academy.
