### Mayor Stewart Extends New Year's Greetings

The following New Year's message to Charlottetown citizens has been received from His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart:  
"The year-end is a time of stock taking, a time to look back and assess the progress we have made during the year. I do not think that the year 1954 will be noted as a year of outstanding accomplishments, insofar as our City was concerned, with one exception, but I can say, without going into detail, that it was a year of good steady healthy civic growth.  
"We did make marked improvements in the paving of our streets, we improved our public buildings and we maintained our public squares and parks in a worth while manner. The exception that I have referred to is that of the opening of our new Queen Charlotte High School, we have waited a long time, over seventy-five years in fact, to add to our City School property. We can, now, all be justly proud of our new building on North River Road. No city in Canada has a finer school.  
"We can give thanks to Almighty God that our city and Province escaped damage in the major storms of the year; and that the overall health of our citizens was good. I feel that there was a real awakening of Civic Pride, as evidenced in the wonderful cooperation of all of our citizens and firms, in providing, at their homes and places of business, such an outstanding display of lights at Christmas time, a display, I hope, that will be maintained, in good part, during the coming year.  
"We are now on the threshold of a new year, a new Century for Charlottetown as a City, a year that will present to all of our citizens, a real challenge to work together, to show to all of the many thousands of visitors that will be with us, that we have the finest City, regardless of size, in this wonderful Dominion of ours. As your Mayor, I pledge myself to give you leadership to this end.  
"My sincere good wishes, for the best of everything, to all of you, in 1955."



The newly acquired building will be used in part as a warehouse for the firm, the front part of the main floor being available for rental as offices or a store. This would eliminate a "dead" spot existing in that area, due to the building being vacant.

By bringing the newly acquired building within the area of their present store, Crockett and Storey Ltd. will be in a position to greatly improve their service to the public. At present the firm maintains a large warehouse at Parkdale, and a warehouse on Grafton Street, with also houses their sheet metal shop, all of which tends to cause delays, increase cost of administration and possible loss of sales.

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### Increased Work Under Amended Federal Contract

Word has been received by Mr. Neil A. Matheson, M.P., from Hon. Robert H. Winters, Federal Minister of Public Works, that an amendment has been approved to the contract entered into with Bruce Stewart and Co. Ltd., for the installation of a large boiler in the "Canso." The total cost of the original contract was \$25,955. In order now to provide for the renewal of the steel deck under the wood decking on each side of the main housing, an additional expenditure of \$9,215 will be involved bringing the cost of the new contract to \$35,150.  
In addition to the above contract, Bruce Stewart and Co., Ltd., will carry out extensive machine work on the engines of two D.P.W. dredges now tied up at North Rustico and Savage Harbor, as well as repairs to scows in Charlottetown. Specifications concerning the nature and cost of this work have not yet been made known but it is understood that it will be to a larger extent than that carried out last winter, when for the first time work of this type was undertaken by a local firm.

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### Decision In Supreme Court

A decision of the full bench of the Supreme Court yesterday was delivered by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, in which for several reasons, he dismissed the objection on a point of law raised by Mr. C. R. McQuaid, appearing for the defendant, Allison MacLeod, in the case of Ford vs MacLeod heard yesterday. The case will now proceed on the merits of negligence at the January sittings of the Supreme Court.  
The case arose out of a claim by Lloyd Ford in which it was alleged that Ford's vehicle on Jan. 6, 1954, was pushing MacLeod's

vehicle through the intersection of Weymouth and Grafton Streets at the request of MacLeod's servant or agent; and that an accident occurred due to the negligence of the driver of the MacLeod vehicle, thereby causing damage to the Ford vehicle.  
Allegations were denied by MacLeod, who further made objection in point of law, that the plaintiff had no cause of action which could be maintained against the defendant, in that by pushing the defendant's auto through an inter-

section, the plaintiff was committing an unlawful act, which said act was a breach of statute and was the direct or proximate cause of any damage to the plaintiff's car.  
The case first came to court last May 14 before Justice M. R. MacGilligan, who referred it to the Supreme Court en banc because of a former decision of that court.
