

New Attractions Planned  
 For Dundas Plowing Match

Several new attractions are planned for the big plowing match and agricultural fair at Dundas on Wednesday and Thursday of the week. It has been learned from L. S. Hunter, association president, Bridgeville.

The match, now in its 22nd year, has grown from a small plowing in government grants, to a class B fair that draws \$500 in grants this year, the president explained. A start has been made this year on a new hog barn.

A full program of 11 plowing events is scheduled with senior gang plow, single furrow for novices and for boys under 16, tractor 2-rod and 3-rod matches and a tractor plow class for boys and girls under 16 on the opening day.

They have saddle classes and carriage horse classes on Wednesday and general purpose and draft classes on the second day of the show.

**CATTLE LEFT TWO DAYS**

 Senior sports events are on Wednesday and junior events on Thursday.

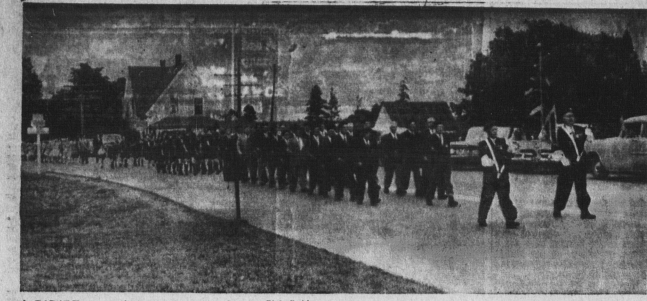
Highland dancing competition will be a feature on the opening day under the direction of Mrs. Douglas MacGowan, Montague. A sep dancing competition will be held on Thursday.

**Commissioning Of Ship Planned**  
 OTTAWA (CP)—HMCS Mackenzie, first of a new class of destroyer escorts, will be commissioned into the Royal Canadian Navy Oct. 6. It was announced here.

The Mackenzie, first of six to be built, is being constructed by Canadian Vickers Ltd., at Montreal. This ship and the five to follow, will be known as the Mackenzie class destroyer escorts. Earlier similar vessels are in the St. Laurent and Restigouche class.

When the Mackenzie ships are completed, the navy will have 20 destroyer escorts in service in three classes.

A memorial service at the cenotaph in Cornwall yesterday afternoon paid tribute to those men of the district who fell in two world wars.

Chicago Man To Lead Pioneers Into Arctic

CHICAGO (AP)—A Chicago man says he is assembling a group of people who will try to get away from it all.

The moving spirit, Robert H. Van Schoick, 31, says his party will embark next spring on a pioneer settling venture in northern Canada.

At this stage, he won't pinpoint the proposed settlement site beyond saying that it isn't north of the 100° line, and it's nowhere in either the Keewatin or Mackenzie districts, but not close to Hudson Bay.

Van Schoick advertised recently in two Chicago newspapers, asking for persons to help him settle a small portion of Canada's Northwest Territories. He now finds himself sifting through more than 300 applications.

"The response has been fabulous. Everyone wants to go," he said.

Van Schoick first planned to take a group of about 20 with him. Now he says there will be trouble doubling the number to 50.

Do Not Inquest Is Scheduled

Chief coroner, Dr. L. E. Prowse last night revealed that no inquest will be held into the death of Montague druggist, Cyril Johnston, whose body was found on the shore at Guernsey Cove last Friday morning.

Mr. Johnston had left Montague on the evening of Sunday, Sept. 2, in his sailboat "The Ghost" and when he failed to return a widespread land, sea and air search was instituted last Tuesday.
