SUMMARY "To summarize, the Government Program has either built or approved of a total mileage of 822 serving a total number of 388 families in the First District of Queens and as at March 11, 1957 there remains waiting a total mileage of 21.8 of which 14.5 miles is now approved for 1957, which has been requested for construction.

"Surely there has been no single Government effort which has been so successful in so short a time.

"In the Province Generally there is a 12 per cent increase in Power requirements each year without regard to extension of lines but due solely to increased use of electricity. The kilowatt hours for 1955 totaled 46,800,000 for the whole Province and to produce this energy required three plants, that of the Maritime Electric of 22,500 Watts, Summerside of 2,735 Watts, Seales 200 Watts.

He also mentioned that a second staff residence at the newly named Riverside Hospital would be necessary when the Active Treatment Centre is in full operation and when student nurses are to be accommodated for a period of affiliation.

Hon. Mr. MacKay: "I am reminded of the words of St. Paul when he said 'much learning hath made them mad.' I think the oratorical powers of these gentlemen have driven them mad."

Doctor Bonnell also remarked on the low incidence of poliomyelitis, only four reported cases, as active cases of the Division of Public Health Nursing and said two doses of vaccine had been given to a large percentage of the children over 15 months of age.

The report to the Legislature also said Tuberculosis Control had been successful in discovering 43 active cases and also 19 cases of reactivation of the disease. He said pulmonary tuberculosis is more common in patients in institutions than in general public due frequently to prolonged nutritional deficiency as well as to emotional factors.

A reduced incidence of venereal disease is reported with medical and laboratory services available for diagnosis and drugs are supplied free of charge for treatment of all reported cases.

GENERAL HOSPITALS In an effort to improve the service in general hospitals post-graduate training courses of varying duration are offered to registered nurses employed in obstetrical and pediatric sections. In the period of 1955-56 there were nine nurses sent on such courses and since three additional nurses have received financial assistance in training.

During the past fiscal year the Crippled Children's Grant from the Federal Government paid 50 per cent of the cost of poliomyelitis vaccine purchased for 24,240 single doses and during the present fiscal year the contribution has amounted to \$9,115.50. The grant also sponsored the continuing training of one student in physiotherapy who will complete her course next year and another student who recently began training the same course, both at McGill University.

The report also mentions the various other matching grants for professional training, hospital construction, mental and general health.

Board of Trade Will Petition For A. D. S. T.

The following is the text of the resolution drawn up by the committee of the Summerside Board of Trade. Presentation of the resolution was authorized at the regular meeting of the board held in the Civic Building on Monday night.

Whereas Standard Time in Prince Edward Island is unsatisfactory for the following reasons: 1. Island firms and individuals doing business with mainland firms and they lose as much as four hours a day working time with their truck drivers and office personnel trying to make connection on the mainland and make deliveries.

2. Radio and T.V. programs operate on Daylight Saving Time. 3. Hotels, Restaurants, cabins and other people catering to the tourist trade find there is confusion and inconvenience that is having an adverse effect on our tourist industry.

4. Adults and children confined inside during most of the year lose the benefits of our short summer evenings. 5. The R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, is on Daylight Saving time and the difference in time between Summerside and the United States has an adverse effect in Summerside, regarding retail and wholesale business and community relations.

6. Air, Ferry, and rail connections are also our of line and the travelling public and visitors have trouble travelling back and forth. Now therefore be it resolved that the Summerside Board of Trade respectfully petition the government to bring our Province into line with our sister Maritime Provinces and invoke one uniform time, namely, Daylight Saving Time. And be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier, the Honourable Alexander W. Matheson, the Members of the Executive Council and our local Members.
