TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. British Parliament.

LONDON, July 25. The report of the Parliamentary Committee on royal grants was called up in the House of Commons this afternoon. W. H. Smith was questioned as to the amount of the Queen's savings, but declined to answer, and moved that the report of the committee be adopted. Mr. Labouchere moved the adoption of his substitute for the committee's report. He said the sums given the royal family were already amply sufficient. If further supplies were needed they ought to be provided through retrenchment in the expenses of the royal household, not by fresh demands upon the taxpayers. Mr. Labouchere proceeded to explain how a reduction in the Queen's household would produce the sum necessary to provide for junior royalties, if the useless offices of Lord Chamberlain, Lord Steward, Master of the Horse, Master of the Buck-hounds, eight Lords-in-Waiting, eight Grooms-in-Waiting, and a number of others were abolished an ample sum would be left for the purpose mentioned. Samuel Storry, M. P. for Sutherland, Radical, seconded the amendment. Mr. Gladstone said he was averse to all measures of economy that impaired the dignity and splendor of the Crown—therefore he supported the Government and rejoiced that occasion was given him to testify in his old age that he did not forget the services he had borne many years in connection with his office as representative of the Crown.

Canadian Cable Company Matters.

OTTAWA, July 25. It is rumored that the Government will be asked to guarantee the interest on the bonds of the Canadian Cable Company to the extent of \$500,000. The capital required is \$1,700,000. Dobell, of Quebec, has already secured \$350,000 of this in England by private subscription and will return to England shortly to raise the sum to \$500,000. Then with the Dominion guarantee he will place \$1,000,000 in the hands of the financial agents and invite subscriptions for the balance. A construction company has been organized to lay the cable which will be the shortest ocean cable of any. Entering the water at the west port of Ireland, it will run to Greenley Island, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, a distance of only 1,900 miles, as against 3,100 to New York via Newfoundland. Mr. Giborne, Government Superintendent of Telegraphs, is now surveying Greenley Island with a view to extending the gulf system of telegraphs to meet the cable.

Jem Smith After John L.

LONDON, July 24. John Fleming, Jem Smith's manager, called at the Sporting Life office to-day in regard to Sullivan's conditional acceptance of Smith's offer to fight for Police Gazette champion belt, and championship of the world. Fleming says Sullivan must defend the championship according to the rules that Smith fought Kilran and the latter fought Sullivan or Smith will claim the belt and championship of the world and stand ready to meet all that come according to prize ring rules, and that the American champion must fight or forfeit the title. Fleming wishes it understood that the Pelican Club is ready to back Smith and arrange any fair match.

Mr. Gladstone's Golden Wedding.

LONDON, July 25. This is the golden wedding day of Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone. The Queen telegraphed a congratulatory message. The Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of the royal family sent letters to them. The Prince of Wales sent a gold inkstand to Mr. Gladstone. A number of Liberal ladies presented a portrait of Gladstone, by Millais. A large number of other presents were received. Gladstone received an immense number of callers during the day.
