**Paris Designer Shows Spring Hats With Larger Brims**

PARIS, Jan. 23 — (AP) — Spring hats with high bowler crowns and brims that widen only at the front were paraded today by Jean Patou who, like many other prominent couturiers, is designing hats as well as dresses nowadays.  
 Most of his hats are generally heavier than other spring models shown to date. But all are worn at the same angle — straight on the head and tilted slightly to the front. Some of his bowler styles, made in off white, pale green or pink, or fawn, straw or glassed plaie, have brims that shoot out in front and fold back over the crown. Other brims develop into six-inch-long crossed "feathers" in front.

**St. Laurent Hopes For Early Start On Seaway Project**

OTTAWA, Jan. 31 — (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent told the Commons today the Government is hopeful that within a short time the United States will take constructive action leading towards a start on the St. Lawrence seaway project.

Replying to a question by Gordon Graydon (PC-Peel), he said the prospects of co-operation between Canada and the U.S. for construction of the whole project "appear to be quite good."

This would embrace both the navigation and power phases.

Mr. St. Laurent did not directly answer Mr. Graydon's question as to whether Canada is prepared to build her share of the seaway alone if the U.S. doesn't act within a reasonable period.

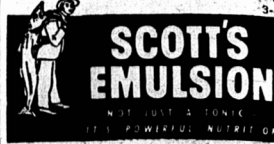
