LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

ENGLISH IN THE SCHOOLS.

Sir,—Those who listened to the criticism of the Hon. Mr. Gordon in the House of Assembly, a few days ago, on the education report for last year, must have been convinced that some of the paid officials connected with the important and expensive work of education in this Province do not give evidence in their reports of having been even fairly instructed in the use of the English language. In fact Mr. Gordon made it plain that they could not be considered as models to those filling humbler positions in our system of education. If the persons or persons referred to by Mr. Gordon are the product of our educational institutions, they are certainly no credit to those concerned. It seems to me that the methods employed in the teaching of English literature at the Prince of Wales College are not calculated to produce the best results, and are not such as are recommended by authorities of rare experience and eminence. In the selection of works of English authors for teaching of literature, I know it is the practice of this institution to select works of poetry such as the plays of Shakespeare and "Paradise Lost." If I am informed correctly, it is some books of the latter work and Macbeth which are engaging the attention of the classes in English this year.

The professors may be fully competent to give instruction in these works, but I am inclined to believe that better results would show themselves by the study of the pretensions works of standard prose. Professor University of Edinburgh, Scotland, whose opinion is entitled to the highest respect, has something to say on this very point in his admirable work, "Education as a Science." As this is a subject of the importance to those engaged in the work of education in this Province, the following selection from Professor Bain may be of interest to your readers.

"At the present time the teaching of literature in schools has taken the form of the study of selected works of the greatest English authors, from Chaucer downwards. Two points have to be considered in connection with the working of this method; the first as to the selection of authors, the second as to the way of handling them.

"In the selection, the later authors are to be preferred to the earlier, and the prose authors to the poets. The first of these two maxims proceeds on the fact that English prose style has improved, and the improvement is manifest in the preference given to prose authors in early teaching—proceeds on the practical consideration that prose is what we habitually employ, while poetry is for our enjoyment, like music and painting. If it is not waste of time, it is at least, great proportion, to keep a class occupied for months on a play of Shakespeare or on three books of Paradise Lost. No doubt, many of the exercises performed on a prose lesson can be performed on poetry; and moreover, the greatest efforts of style as such are put forth by the poets. Yet the argument is unanswerable that if these exercises are to improve our own composition, it is as prose compositors; and for a good model of prose we must refer, not to a poet, but to a writer of prose. We may admire Chaucer, Shakespeare, Milton and Pope, but they are not the one thing useful in an English class. The best English teaching would say little about them at the time, but would, nevertheless, give the pupils the aptitude and the zest for reading them when they left school. Not one of these writers is child's play. None of them can be read with any tolerable appreciation before eight or ten years, and the full enjoyment of them is much later."
