The Closing Ceremonies

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

List of Bills Passed During The Session.

The Provincial Legislature was formally prorogued on Saturday. At three o'clock His Honor the Lieutenant Governor entered the Assembly room and after assenting in the name of Her Majesty to the bills passed closed the session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

At the close of this the first session of the present Legislature, I have much pleasure, now that your duties have drawn to an end, in acknowledging the care and close attention devoted to the business of the Province, and to thank you for the great assistance you have afforded me in carrying on the Government of this Island.

I appreciate and thank you for the provision you have made for the requirements of the public service, and I assure you that the application of the supplies granted will be made with a view to the best welfare of the country, and with a due regard for economy.

In taking leave of you for the recess, I express the earnest hope that, under Divine Providence, the work of the session now closed will conduce to the prosperity of this Province.

The Guard of Honor was under command of Captain D. Stewart, and the salute from Fort Edward was fired by a detachment from No. 1 Company, Canadian Artillery, under command of Captain Davison.

An Act to incorporate the Farmers Institute of Cherry Valley.
