Foreign Trade Balance Declined In January

OTTAWA, March 14 —(CP)—
Canada's foreign trade surplus—
an indicator of foreign-trade
health—dipped to \$11,800,000 in
January, the lowest in post-war
years.
The Bureau of Statistics today
noted that January's balance of
exports over imports compared
with a balance of \$15,200,000 in
January, 1949, and a whopping
balance of \$104,900,000 in 1945.
January's balance was com-
pared with the December surplus
of \$74,900,000, highest monthly
credit in 1949.
Buying less in January, than at
the same time last year, Canada
also sold less in foreign markets.
Commodity exports of \$223,800,000,
compared with \$239,000,000 last year
imports of \$211,900,000 compared
with \$223,900,000.

In January, last year, Canada's
surplus in the U.K., while higher
at \$30,500,000, was far short of the
deficit of \$47,300,000 with the U.S.
January's deficit in trade with
the U.S. followed abnormal
credit balances totalling \$21,600,000
in November and December.
Exports to the U.S. in January
at \$138,000,000 rose from \$117,500,000
last year to reach the highest
peacetime figure for that month.
In contrast, imports from the U.S.
continued a recent downward
trend, touching \$154,500,000, com-
pared with \$164,000,000 a year ago.
In line with the U.K. policy to
cut purchases of dollar goods
wherever feasible, exports to the
U.K. dropped to \$48,900,000, down
\$7,000,000 from \$55,900,000 a year
earlier.
Imports from the U.K. edged
slightly ahead to \$26,100,000 from
\$26,400,000.
Cutting imports from the U.S.
by \$10,000,000, Canada also snipped
purchases from other foreign
countries by \$11,900,000.

To Observe Anniversary Of Dunkerque Rescue

LONDON, March 15—(CP)—The
spunky British yachtsmen and
"Sunday sailors" who helped rescue
the British Expeditionary Force
from Dunkerque beaches in 1940
are to make the trip again.
It's a sentimental journey com-
memorating the great armada of
little ships which streamed from
England to the French shore 10
years ago to aid the hard-pressed
Royal Navy, Bombed and strafed,
the amateur sailors plied from
beach to ship embarking the ex-
hausted British and Allied troops
driven to the coast by the Nazi
 blitzkrieg.
Many civilian would-be rescuers
died with the soldiers they tried
to save. German fighters riddled
their tiny vessels with machine-
gun fire. Some launches sank un-
der the weight of the troops jam-
med on board. But most of the
motley array of pleasure craft got
home.
The plan is for a fleet of little
ships—yachts, lighters, launches—
to follow the course to Dunkerque
taken in 1940. A memorial service
will be held either in Dunkerque
or on the beaches.
Fewer risks will be taken this
time. Warned the Ministry of
Transport: "During the 1940 eva-
cuation we could have little regard
for the seaworthiness of the ships
which went to the rescue.
"But in 1950 practical seamen
should make sure that only suit-
able craft make the trip. We can't
count on the calm weather we had
in 1940."
