P.E.I.H. Nurses Hold Graduation Dance At "Y"

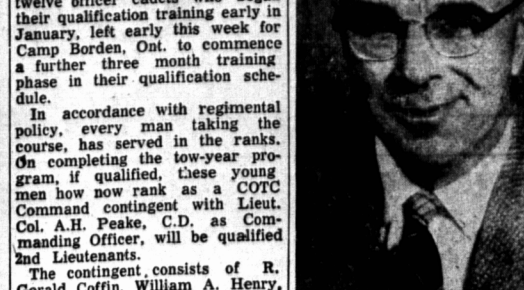
