Contract Bridge

TOO CAUTIOUS

It is all very well to be afraid of "doubling the opponents out" at a part-score contract, but there is also such a thing as over-timidity in this respect. Observe East's exaggerated caution in this case:

North dealer.
East-West vulnerable.

♠ A Q 10 3
 ♥ Q 6 2
 ♦ K 10 9 5 2
 ♣ 4

♠ 7 6 4 2
 ♥ K J 7
 ♦ A Q 8 4
 ♣ 8 7

♠ K J 9 8
 ♥ 9 4 3
 ♦ 7 3
 ♣ K Q 10

The bidding:

North	East	South	West
1♦	Pass	1♠	Pass
2♦	2NT	3♠	Pass
Pass	Pass (1)		

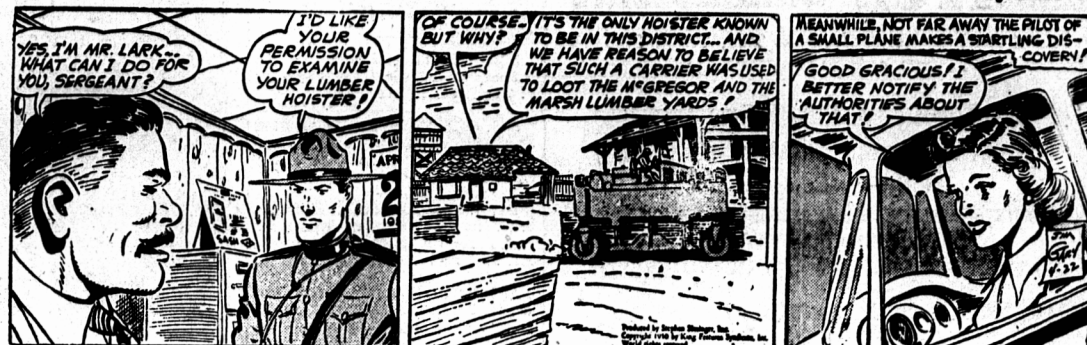
West was far from safe when, vulnerable against non-vulnerable opponents, he doubled South's spade response for a take-out. True, West wished to invite a response in the "other major suit" by partner, and in that sense his double was better than a two-club over-call, but the fact remains that either the double or the club bid involved considerable danger. From West's point of view it was all the more disappointing, therefore, that having taken the risk, there should have been no fitting reward when the bidding developed in a way that was highly favorable to the East-West pair! The three-spade contract was defeated three tricks, but the 150 points East West should have been 500 points! It is difficult to understand why East should have "retired" when the three-spade bid came around to him! While he had no trick in spades, he did have spade length which would surely be a source of annoyance to the enemy; and East's heart and diamond strength spoke for itself. Even if West had shaded his takeout double considerably, where could North-South possibly hope to find nine tricks? A penalty double by East did not have one chance in ten to go wrong!

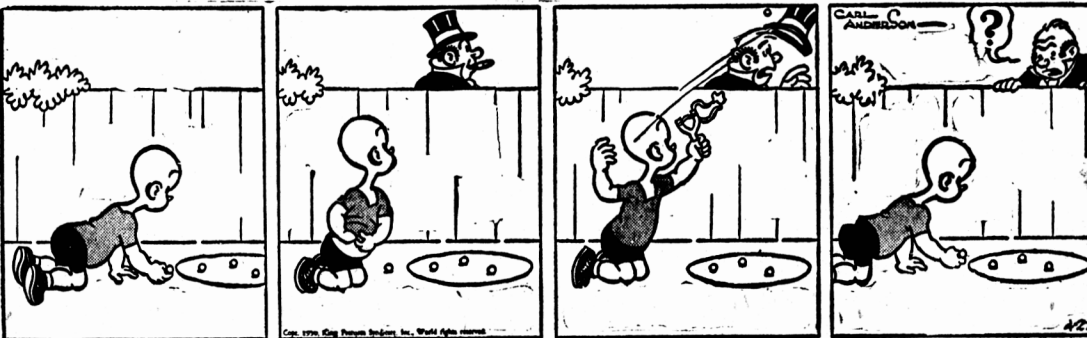

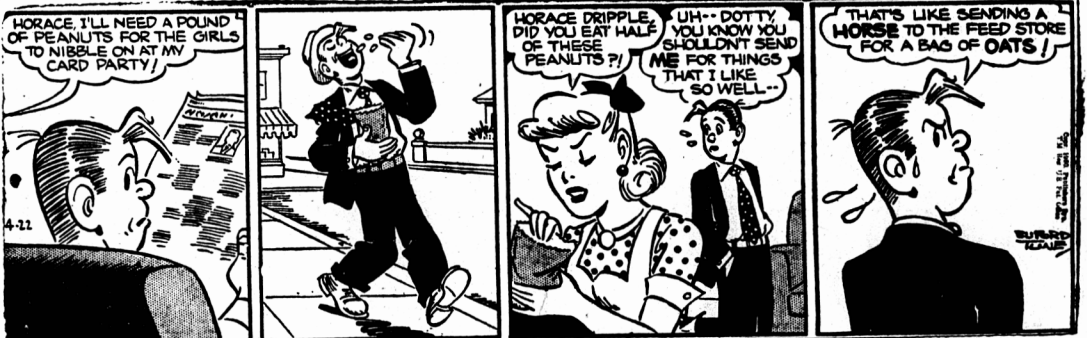
