The butter market exhibits little change since yesterday, either in tone or values sales being reported by dealers at 17c @ 19c in lots. Stocks, although accumulating, are not large, and shippers do not appear at all anxious to take hold.

The traffic in horses during the past week shows a falling off as compared with that of the week previous. Still a fair amount of work was done at an average of \$93.50 against \$95 for the previous week. Mr. Arthur Ryan intends shipping a fine lot of Upper Canada carriage horses to England by the *Polynesian*, and we understand a number of other lots will follow. Last week the exports of horses from this city to the United States amounted to 206 head, costing \$18,025.50.

**SHEEP SALES.**—A Toronto despatch says: Mr. Britton, of this city, reports a heavy transaction in sheep. Mr. Wm. Gordon, of Wellington Co., has agreed to furnish Mr. Ryan, the Quebec shipper, with 1,000 sheep during the first week of July at 5c per pound, live weight, the animals to average 150 pounds. The impetus that has recently been given to the importation of beef, mutton and other provisions from Australia to England ought to stir up the people of Canada to strenuous efforts in the same field of enterprise.—*Montreal Gazette.*
