FOR THE WINDSOR SUFFERERS.

Meeting of Citizens Yesterday.—Contributions of Money and Clothing. At the call of Mayor Dawson a meeting of citizens was held in the City Council Chamber yesterday afternoon to take measures for the relief of the sufferers by the recent fire at Windsor. There was a fair attendance of ladies and gentlemen, and much sympathy was expressed for the victims of the fire fiend.

A letter was read from Mayor Dawson regretting his inability to be present because of illness, and expressing the hope that immediate action would be taken. He also enclosed a substantial subscription towards the relief fund.

Mr. Horace Hazard was called to the chair, and explained the object of the meeting. He regretted that the attendance was not larger, but the shortness of the notice given was doubtless the cause. The matter of relieving the sufferers by the fire was one that required immediate action, and what there was to be given should be given promptly.

After some further discussion the meeting proceeded to business. On motion of Sir Louis Davies a committee of seven was appointed to solicit subscriptions and make collections of money and useful articles.

The motion carried and the following committee was struck: Mr. A. B. Warburton, Lt.-Col. Moore, Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Hon. David Laird, Councillor Nicholson, Patrick Blake and Capt. D. Stewart. City Clerk Davison was, on motion, appointed treasurer, and a subscription list was at once opened. Upwards of \$300 was subscribed on the spot, which, with other subscriptions to follow, will be duly credited in the daily papers.

The chairman placed an office in the Cameron Block at the disposal of the committee, also a warehouse for the reception of any articles donated and contributions received. The offer was thankfully accepted.

Sir Louis Davies stated that the Steam Navigation Company would transport, free of charge, any packages for the relief of the sufferers.

Superintendent Sharp telephoned the City Clerk that the I. C. R. would carry all donations from Pictou to Windsor free of charge.

It was suggested that a ladies' auxiliary committee be appointed to assist the general committee.

The meeting then adjourned, the committee remaining to make further arrangements.

Of the latter there was a large crowd present to witness the collegians undergo their annual "exams", in the events prescribed for the athletic curriculum. But despite this apparent slowness a most enjoyable day was the result.

In the evening the prizes, which, by the way, were kindly donated by friends in the city and which included some very valuable articles, were presented to the winners in the college hall.

Further cases of living burials by members of the fanatical religious sect known as the Raskolniki have been discovered in the Trans-Ural region.
