CONDENSED MILK.—The Truro Condensed Milk and Canning Company, Limited, whose building and works were completely destroyed by fire in May last, have got their new premises completed, and work was resumed last week. The building is L-shaped and covers a ground space of some 13,000 feet. The main portion is two storeys high, the north-west angle, where the condenser is situated, towering to three storeys. The floor space in the building contains an area of 15,148 feet with the addition of 3600 feet of floor space in the boiler room. The machinery, etc., placed in position is all of the most modern make, and will have about the same capacity as that of the old building.

TROUBLE IN A CHURCH.—Collingwood, Ont., has had a little excitement, which ended in a dollar and costs and a fire, but not until the congregation of a colored church had taken possession of the sacred edifice and barred out their pastor. The trouble began in a squabble between a class-leader, Mr. E. W. Cooper, and the Rev. Mr. Brown. One night last week both the church and the parsonage were burned down, and suspicion has it that the congregation has thus emphatically "fired" the Rev. Mr. Brown.

TWO FLAGS BUT ONE SPIRIT.—In the course of his opening remarks at the Baptist Young Peoples' Union in Buffalo, N. Y., last week, President Chapman said: "To-day we meet under two flags, but with one spirit. (Applause). The Union Jack is drooping to day because God has lately called home one of England's many heroes, William Ewart Gladstone. There is sorrow also beneath our flag because we have been called upon to chastise another nation in the cause of liberty and right."

RICHARD HARDING DAVIS, the author who is war correspondent for the Boston Herald, says that Captain Arthur Lee, R. A., was the only foreign military attaché who advanced with the firing line in the battles of July 1 and 2 before Santiago. All the other attachés but one remained at General Shafter's headquarters, three miles in the rear. The other mendid not get within seven miles of the scene of action. But Captain Lee went with the 12th regiment up the hill when they charged the fort of El Caney. While maintaining his position as a noncombatant, he rendered timely aid to the wounded under an incessant fire. He is at present the only attaché living in the rifle pits, because they occupy the only ground from which the two armies may be seen. Capt Lee is professor of military history and topography, surveying reconnaissance, strategy and tactics at the Canadian Royal Military College, Kingston.
