

Johnnie Kalmuck Wins Free-For-All At Tuesday Night Racing Meet

Johnnie in winning the feature event of the night lowered his own mark of 2:10 1/5 and was given great drives in both dashes by his owner, Walter Kelly.

Johnnie moved up from third place in the stretch to win the first heat followed by Abbelland, Direct Mite, and A. G. Scott in that order. In the second heat A. G. Scott went away in front followed by Abbelland but once again it was the Kalmuck gelding as he came from fourth place in the stretch to win by a length.

The only other double heat winner was Time Table. The McKenna-driven horse took the lead at the quarter mile mark in both dashes and remained there throughout the miles.

Other winners of the night's card were Miss Commando and Frankie Budlong in the Prowse Bros classified pace. Miss Commando came from third place in the stretch to win in a photo finish with Frankie and Mighty Deb in the first heat, but in the second Frankie Budlong wasn't to be denied as he led from wire to wire.

Ted Williams Heading For Fenway Park

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The United States Marine Corps has ordered Ted Williams back to Fenway Park, and baseball's most celebrated citizen set out Tuesday for Boston to resume his twice-interrupted career.

"I'm anxious to get back in the line-up," Williams told a press conference. "I can already hear those guys with the bazooks in left field and that's all right with me."

Williams flew 38 combat missions in Korea before returning to the U. S.

The 34-year-old Boston Red Sox outfielder looked in the peak of condition as he received his release.

The former Capt. Williams said he will confer with Joe Cronin, general manager of the Red Sox. "After all," he said, "I don't even know if they want me or not."

The Marines released Williams more than two months before the date he was due to go off active duty. That was because doctors in Korea decided an ear and nose ailment rendered him useless as a combat pilot.

The ailment isn't going to hurt him as a baseball player. "They found out it was an allergy that was bothering me," Williams said. "I get some treatment for it in Boston, but it isn't going to affect me in swinging a bat."

Chances are Williams won't get into the Boston line-up as a regular player for two weeks, but he should be ready for heavy duty during the last six weeks of the season, when the Red Sox will be driving as hard as they can in the American League race.

Just how much Williams will get by way of salary for the final months of the 1953 season is something no one knows.

HALIFAX (CP) — Bob Oxner of Halifax defeated Syd Bartlett, Nova Scotia's top-seeded player, in a major upset of the provincial senior tennis tournament here Tuesday.

Playing the best game of his career, Oxner downed the top-ranking Halifaxian 6-2, 2-6, 6-3 and advanced to the men's singles quarter-finals by defeating Eric Sutherland, Dartmouth, N.S., 6-4, 6-0.

Ken Reardon, Halifax, scored the only other upset by eliminating Jimmy Streeter, Rothesay, N.B., seeded No. 8 in the men's singles, 6-8, 6-1, 8-6. He advanced to the quarter-finals by trimming Berney Creighton, Halifax, 7-5, 6-4.

In the women's singles, Mrs. Jean MacPherson, Bridgewater, N. S., 6-1, 6-1, and Vida Large, Halifax, 6-3, 6-1, to move into the semi-finals with Anne Stacey, the defending champion.

Five Charlottetown players saw action for the first time in the meet and two were defeated.

Ivan Dowling bowed to Jack Piers of Bridgewater 6-4, 6-2 and Mark MacGuigan was defeated by Arthur Mills, Winchester, Mass., 6-0, 6-1.

Roberts Shooting For ERA Crown

NEW YORK, (AP) — Rugged Robin Roberts is trying on the National League earned-run crown for size and if he likes the fit he can become the first Philadelphia Phillies pitcher to win the title in 36 years.

Statistics compiled by the Associated Press show the 26-year-old righthander has allowed 56 earned runs in 221 innings for a 2.28 ERA, lowest in the league. Figures include games Sunday.

No Phillie hurler has captured earned-run honors since Grover Cleveland Alexander, accomplished the feat three seasons in a row from 1915 to 1917.

Roberts tops the league in just about every pitching department. He has the most victories, 17; the most inning pitched, 221; the most complete games, 24; the most strikeouts, 116, and the most shut-outs, five.

Hoyt Wilhelm, last season's earned-run leader, is runner-up with a 2.34 mark.

Lefty Warren Spahn of Milwaukee Braves is third, with a 2.73 average.

Virgil Trucks, traded from St. Louis Browns to Chicago White Sox in mid-June, is the American League earned-run leader with a 2.50 average. The 34-year-old fireballer, in his 12th season in the majors, has given up 45 earned runs in 162 innings.

Cleveland's Bob Lemon trails Trucks in the earned-run listings with 2.66. Southpaw Ed Lopat of the Yanks is third with 2.74.

Plans For 60,000 Seat Stadium

TORONTO, (CP)—The Canadian National Exhibition stadium, a sports venue elephant since it was built a few years ago, may be used as a site to lure the summer Olympic Games and major league baseball to this city. Plans are under way to make it the biggest sports arena in the country.

The scheme calling for a permanent 60,000-seat \$2,000,000 stadium—and still very much in the blueprint stage—was disclosed Tuesday by Allan Lamport, the city's sports-minded mayor. He, and a few businessmen and sports officials, have hopes that in the near future Toronto will be host to the world's Olympic athletes and will also get a major-league ball franchise.

The stadium would be completed in time for the 1964 football season in late August.
