The lecture was under the auspices of the Epworth League of Grace Church, and the subject was "Wordsworth's Conception of Human Nature." The lecture throughout was highly edifying and most instructive. Rev. Mr. Kirby presided, and the lecturer was tendered a hearty vote of thanks at the close of his discourse.

**MR. **SPRING IN ENGLAND.**—In England, according to the London Times of the 19th of last month, the season was quite as far advanced as at that date last year, judging at least from the native flora. The marsh marigold was imparting brilliancy to "the swamps and hollows gray"; the dainty little moscabat had opened its quaint head of pale flowers, and the black bud-scales of the ash had fallen apart, revealing a wealth of purple antlers. The honey suckle, the alder and the wayfaring-tree were in leaf, as was also the white thorn and the hedge row briars, while the hornbeams and maples had broken their bud.

**A STORY OF P. E. I.**—In the last number of the Navy and Army mention is made that the 29th Foot, now the 1st Battalion Worcestershire Regiment is nicknamed "The Ever Sworded Twenty Ninth." because for a number of years the officers always sat at mess with their swords belted on. This custom arose from the fact that when a part of the regiment was quartered in St. John's Island in the eighteenth century, they were all surprised, when unarmed, and slaughtered in the most treacherous manner by Indians, hounded on by the French. About forty years ago the custom was so modified in that only the captain and subaltern of the day dined at mess armed with their swords. At the present time this is still carried on.

**ISLAND STUDENTS AT MCGILL.**—A Montreal correspondent writes: The annual convocation for the conferring of degrees in the medical faculty of McGill University, Montreal, was held on April 2nd. Among the successful candidates for the degree of M. D., C. M., are those of five of our Island boys. They are: Messrs. W. Johnston, Charlottetown; J. B. Trainor Kelly's Cross; J. A. Johnson, Emerald; G. P. McDougall, Grand River; and W. P. McNally, Abram's Village. The high standing taken by the several gentlemen in their class is praiseworthy. In a class of 85 J. B. Trainor takes third place in Ophthalmology, and J. A. Johnson ranks fourth in Obstetrics. Johnson also wins first-class honors in Surgery and Ophthalmology, while Trainor in addition to the above is an honor man in Gynecology. W. Johnston holds a like position in Practical Pathology and Obstetrics. The names of W. P. McNally and G. P. McDougall are likewise high on the honor list.

### TROOPS FOR ENGLAND.

The adjutants of the Artillery, Engineers and 82nd Battalion have received a circular letter, from which we are enabled to clip the following:

Brigade Office, Montreal, 2nd April, 1897.

Sir,—It is probable that a small battalion of picked men from the different corps of the active militia of Canada will go to England about the 1st of June next to take part in the ceremonies in connection with Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee.

The refusal of a troopship has been secured, and a careful estimate of the expenses prepared. These will amount to about \$100 per man. Contributions, however, have been promised, which will reduce the average to \$50 per man. The expenses of the expedition to be borne by the contingent have been estimated and divided as follows: Captains, \$400; Lieutenants, \$300; 2nd Lieutenants, \$300; N. C. Officers, \$60; and men, \$50.

The rates are intended to cover maintenance, throughout the trip, as provided for Imperial troops, from Montreal to England and return.

This contingent is to be distinctly representative of the country and force, and will, therefore, be composed of officers and men from the various battalions throughout the Dominion.

Applicants must be between the ages of 20 and 35 years, not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height, and 37 inches chest measurement at normal inspiration.
