**Moore's Goal Gives Habs 2-1 Stanley Cup Victory**

MONTREAL (CP) — Dickie Moore's tie-breaking goal at 13:32 of the second period, when Jean Beliveau lured goalie Don Simmons out of position, gave Montreal Canadiens a 2-1 win over Boston Bruins Tuesday night in a bruising, battering opener of the Stanley Cup final. Berni (boom Boom) Geoffrion scored for Montreal at 12:24 of the opening period, a bitter 20-minute battle all its own with 13 penalties, and Allan Stanley winged in a shot for the Bruins at 5:54 of the second period.

Leo Labine of Boston was sitting out a tripping penalty when Moore, National Hockey League scoring champion this season, supplied the winner at the height of a roaring Montreal power play. The highly geared teams started the opener of the best-of-seven cup final in a fashion more resembling mayhem than hockey. The penalties dwindled to six in the second period and two in the third.

Both teams were tiring in the final stages but were still giving all they had. Simmons was pulled from the Boston net, in favor of an extra forward, with 28 seconds of the third period left. Canadiens fought off Boston's last desperate drive. Bert Olmstead relieved the pressure by firing the puck down the ice, with no attempt to aim for the net. Jean Beliveau picked it up off the side boards and shot wide at the open net from a sharp angle, missing it.

The roaring, screeching crowd of 14,816 saw one of the most savagely fought first periods in cup play, with rocking, solid body checks and plenty of off-color stuff. The crowd saw also brilliant goal-tending displays by Jacques Plante of Montreal and Simmons, despite the slender Boston goalie's questionable gamble in the second period.

**PENALTIES HEAVY**  
 Referee Red Storey saved offenders to the penalty box in a steady stream. The teams finally cooled out but not before 13 first-period penalties had been imposed—two short of a playoff record—including two major penalties for fighting to Henri Richard of Montreal and Doug Mohns of Boston.

**ROCKET PASSES**  
 Maurice (Rocket) Richard fought his way deep in the Boston end, well to the side of the net. He passed to Beliveau, a few feet off to Simmons' left. Simmons apparently tried to prevent Beliveau from shooting. Beliveau pulled the puck back, Simmons took the bait. Again Beliveau pulled back and Simmons appeared ready to dive for the puck.

The penalties dwindled to six in the second period and two in the third. Both teams were tiring in the final stages but were still giving all they had. Simmons was pulled from the Boston net, in favor of an extra forward, with 28 seconds of the third period left.

**MIC'S NET**  
 Canadiens fought off Boston's last desperate drive. Bert Olmstead relieved the pressure by firing the puck down the ice, with no attempt to aim for the net. Jean Beliveau picked it up

Larry Regan was sitting out a Boston bench penalty — for too many men on the ice — when Geoffrion opened the scoring. The Boomer, used also for a few turns on this line, took Don Marshall's backward pass and rifled a 30-footer past Simmons. Stanley's second period goal, tying the score, came in similar fashion. Beliveau was in the penalty box on a tripping charge when Don McKenney and Fleming MacKell combined on a relay to Stanley. The Bruin defenceman powered a 40-foot screened shot that whistled past Plante.
