EIGHT hundred and seventy-two cars of freight were reported inwards and outwards at the Halifax terminus last week.

THERE were twenty-three new post-offices established in March; nine in Manitoba, ten in Ontario, one in P. E. Island and three in Quebec.

THE burning of a shed at the Royal Albert Docks, London, is ascribed to the Fenians, who are supposed to have contemplated a raid for arms.

THE Queen is accompanied by the Princess Louise on her visit to the Continent. She will spend a full month on the Continent, the probable date of her re-embarkation being April 15th.

MAJOR-GENERAL SIR EVELYN WOOD, K. C. B., was invested by the Queen with the insignia of a Knight Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, at Windsor, on the 20th February.

ALTHOUGH the date of Prince Leopold's marriage has not been formally announced, the officials have received private notification that the ceremony will take place at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, on 27th April.

THE brigantine "Erin," built on P. E. I., is ashore at Shelburne, N. S. She is owned at present in Halifax. The schr. "Tracy Jane," also owned in Halifax, bound from St. Domingo to Philadelphia, is a total wreck at Carco's passage.

A GREENOCK cable of the 6th inst., reports that the Maggie A. Robertson, in the graving dock there, filled and tank on Saturday afternoon (March 4), when water was being let into the dock. It is expected that she will be pumped out and got on the blocks again by to-morrow (March 7).

POTATO MARKETS.—The heavy arrivals of Foreign Potatoes at the port of New York have completely demoralized the market. The receipts from Scotland, England, and Germany alone for the months of January and February amounted to 234,000 sacks of 24 bushels each—equal to 5,820,000 bushels. Prices for imported stock have declined in the Atlantic. Onenagoes, which a month ago were selling freely in Boston at 90 to 95 cents are now quoted dull at 60 to 65 cents. This is not encouraging for shipments from the Island this spring.

ANOTHER COMET.—An Albany, N. Y., despatch of the 18th inst., states that about 4 o'clock, a. m., Charles S. Wells, of the Dudley Observatory here, discovered a bright comet in Hercules, right ascension 17 hours and 52 minutes north, declination 32° 30'. The comet has a tail about five minutes in length, and a nucleus of about the sixth magnitude. A later despatch says:—The discovery of the first comet of the year by Charles Wells, of the Dudley Observatory, on Friday, was verified to-night by Prof. Bos, who located it in right ascension 17° 53', declination 35° 30'. The comet is moving north-east at the rate of 33 minutes per day.

WHEN we hear wealthy property-holders stating, in their places, as the Representatives of the people, in the popular branch of the Legislature, that the old, worn-out story of retaining the Legislative Council, in order to guard the rights of property, is an exploded theory, not worthy the serious consideration of any man who really wishes to abolish that useless appendage to Provincial Legislation; and when we compare the position and influence of those property-holders with those of the members of the Legislative Council, who seemingly are so zealous for the retention of the existence of the Council, we cannot but come to the conclusion, in common with the large majority of the taxpayers of this Province, that the Legislative Council should be numbered among the things of the past.

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Mrs. Morrison, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment for stealing clothing from Mrs. Bateman.

A CLERK in the general office of the I. C. Railway, Moncton, named Stanley Moore, seriously stabbed a fellow clerk named Sydney Halls, on the 20th instant. Moncton was excited over the affair for a day or two.

A HALIFAX man named John Bennett was arrested for bigamy at Fredericton, N. B., on the 15th instant. He pleaded guilty and was remanded to jail to await trial in the Supreme Court.

THE barque Ringwood, Captain P. Trainor, owned by Longworth & Co., of this city, which left Sydney for St. John's, on the 26th of January last, has turned up all right at St. Pierre, Miq. She will proceed to her destination as soon as the ice will permit.

LIEUT.-COLONEL JOHN BOSGHEV, Duke of Edinburgh's Wiltshire Regiment (62nd), is vacating the appointment of Brigade Major to the Forces at Halifax, N. S., he having been ordered home to join the 1st Battalion of his Regiment on its arrival from Aden.

WALLACE ROSS expects that he will after all, visit England. The announcement that Laycock and Pearce (an earman who it is claimed can beat Laycock) are to go there possibly has made Ross think there is more money in England than in this country.

THE NORTH WEST.—North West mania is taking a grip of Halifax this season. Mr. James Shand held an auction of lots of lands in Southern Manitoba in his rooms, on the 20th. The sale was well attended, the bidding spirited, and the prices obtained good.—Chronicle.

A MAN named Genet, a resident of St. Sauveur, a suburb of Quebec, was beaten to death on Saturday night last, almost at his own door. A companion was badly handled. The parties who committed the deed are said to have been employed in a factory of which Genet was foreman, and they have been arrested.

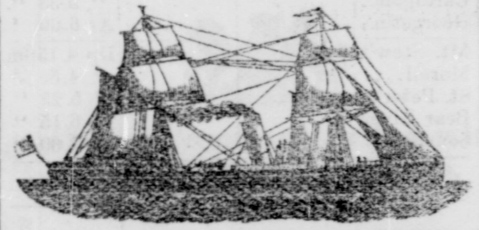
THE contractors for 500 miles of the Canada Pacific Railway on the plains of the North West are about to issue a notice calling for 5,000 men at ruling wages of \$2 per day, with every facility for getting cheap board in addition. This certainly looks like business and a determination on the part of the company to reach the Rocky Mountains this year.

A WINNIPEG despatch of the 19th instant says:—"Carpenters, both here and at Brandon, will strike for \$7 per day on the 1st of April. Hundreds of tents are being put up in all parts of the city to accommodate immigrants who are now putting in. Regular and special trains are laden every trip with people from both Canada and the United States.

GEN. SKOBELOFF is thirty-nine years old, but looks almost a decade younger. In the morning and afternoon the coat is a blue frock, loose, of stylish cut; and buttoned across the chest. The trousers, of grey tweed, are also an easy fit, and they half hide feet too small to be in proportion to the General's stature.
