That Unless British Troops are Withdrawn from Belfast Within 72 Hours Hostilities Will Begin. British Officers on Leave Ordered to Duty.

DUBLIN, June 23.—Rory O'Connor, Commander of the Irish Republican Army Insurgents has sent an ultimatum to Lloyd George that unless the British troops were removed from Dublin within seventy-two hours military action will be taken.

Wilson's Assassination Part of Murder Plot

Documents Discovered by London Police Show That Murder of Field Marshal Wilson Was But the First Blow in Conspiracy to Murder Opponents of Irish Republic. Fifteen Arrests Made.

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, June 23.—The police investigating the assassination of Field Marshal Wilson have come into possession of documents, says the Central News today disclosing a conspiracy to take the lives of a number of prominent persons and conduct a campaign of outrage.

Three factors led the police and military authorities to suspect that Wilson's death may have been only the first blow of a widespread murder plot against opponents of the Irish Republic.

A quantity of arms and ammunition, including hand grenades and gelignite was discovered in a house within a stone's throw of Eaton Place where Sir Harry Wilson was shot down.

Stories of witnesses to the shooting of Wilson agree that apparent accomplices of the assassin were in the neighborhood and attempted to divert the chase following the murder.

Fifteen men and one woman were arrested in the raids following London last night in connection with the assassination it was announced in the House of Commons this morning by Mr. Chamberlain.

U. S. PRESS HORRIFIED AT CRIME

NEW YORK, June 23.—The assassination of Field Marshal Wilson in London fills the New York press with horror at the crime and fears as to the future. "It is more an instance of the malignant date which has historically pursued the cause of Irish self-government," says The Times which the Herald uses practically the same words.

The assassination of Field Marshal Wilson is further ghastly evidence of the malign spirit that still haunts parts of Ireland. "It was

KIWANIS OWN TORONTO

TORONTO, June 23.—Toronto is in possession of the delegates to the sixth international convention of Kiwanis Clubs. Up to the present time between four and five thousand delegates are registered, and many more will reach the city today. Toronto's invitation was taken at its face value, and the number who has responded is really in excess of the estimate, although not beyond the capacity of the local club or the city to look after. Delegates are in attendance from Maine to California, and from the Gulf of Mexico to the northern districts of Alberta.

The motto is "We Build," and its practical working out was stated by The Globe last night by Harry Kerr of Baltimore, International President, who declared that the whole movement was to get men to appreciate the other fellow's viewpoint, and when this was done nations would also benefit. "To deal four-square on all things is what we aim to achieve," he said.

Progressives Prepare For Stiff Fighting On Railway Bill

OTTAWA, June 23.—Liberals and Progressives held separate caucuses this morning and while the report of the transportation costs committee has not yet been formally presented, it is believed that freight rates formed the chief topic of discussion at both gatherings.

The report in question has been drafted and re-drafted without bringing satisfaction to those who demand the reinstatement of the Crows Nest agreement and of wheat and wheat products and the Progressives are girding up their loins for a fight in the House in the event of failure to gain their end. In committee this morning ways and means for the carrying out of an effective blockade are understood to have been discussed.

U. S. Marine Band Entertains Signal Troops in Camp Here

On Wednesday evening No. 8 Signal Company in camp at Victoria Park were entertained from 8 p.m. until 11 p.m. with a splendid programme put on by radio from the United States Naval Air Station at Anacostia, D. C. The orchestra, which is a part of the band, played many dance selections and other popular pieces and could be heard anywhere within 150 feet of the wireless tent at the park.

Communications With Warship

The training of No. 8 Signal Company is proceeding with much enthusiasm despite the rain the second day's camp, and the officers are well satisfied with the progress made. Yesterday communications were opened early between the signal company and H. M. S. Raleigh by helio and flag signaling. The company is ready to handle all official and social messages between the ship and shore.

Arrangements have already been made for the participation of the Signal company in the camp sports to be held in the park this afternoon at 2 p.m., details of which appear elsewhere in The Guardian.

Big Radio Possibilities

The radio service, which forms such a convenient feature of the Signal camp this year, is but in its infancy, and has vast possibilities for popular entertainment and education. The fact that yesterday morning the operators in camp set their watches by the tick of a clock in Halifax, and verified the time in the evening by a clock in New York, is an illustration of the many uses to which radio service will eventually adapt itself. There are at present twenty installations of radio phones on the island and Major Rogers of the Signal Company predicts that within a year this number will be increased to between one and two hundred.

Charlottetown Welcomes H. M. S. Raleigh

Visiting Cruiser Arrived Early Yesterday Morning and Will Remain Until Next Thursday.

The arrival of H. M. S. Raleigh off Victoria Park at an early hour yesterday morning was somewhat of a surprise as the cruiser was not expected until later in the day. News of the arrival, however, quickly spread through the city and many regretted the haziness of the atmosphere which prevented a good view of the ship from the shore. Later in the day, when visitors were received on board, a closer inspection was permitted and the fact that the ship is open to visitors every afternoon from two till five will no doubt be taken advantage of.

H. M. S. Raleigh is one of the latest types of cruisers having been launched in 1921. She is 605 feet long, registers 9,750 tons and has a speed of 30 knots. She has 7.5 inch guns, 4, 3 inch anti-aircraft guns, six torpedo tubes and is well equipped with machine guns. There are about 800 men on board.

The arrival of this handsome cruiser at a time when local militia are in camp adds interest to the event and considerably on-lives business in the city. The number of soldiers and sailors promenade the streets last night, though reminiscent of less peaceful days. The khaki and blue blended admirably and indeed many friendships have already been struck up by the boys of the different services, who vied with each other in presenting a neat appearance and in their orderly conduct.

At 10 o'clock yesterday H. M. S. Raleigh was visited by Governor Kinross and later a larger party arrived to attend the regular dance at the luncheon. Mr. P. H. Malcolm and Dr. Goodwill who also visited the ship extended on behalf of the Golf Club, the privilege of the Links. A number of officers accepted the invitation yesterday and this afternoon and on Wednesday next a match will be played with local teams.

On Monday night a concert for the benefit of the Navy League, will be given by the men of the ship in the Opera House. Arrangements are also being made for the holding of a concert by the ships in the Queen Square Gardens.

On Tuesday night Lieutenant Governor MacKinnon and Mrs. MacKinnon will entertain the officers with a ball at Beach Grove Inn.

This afternoon athletic sports will be held. (The program appears elsewhere in the Guardian.) On Sunday the Admiral will entertain the Governor and his party at luncheon on board ship.
